Re: Proposed Amendments to Food Service and Private Sewage Disposal Ordinances Increasing Permit Fees 3%

Please find attached amendments to the McLean County Revised Code, Chapter 26, Food Service and Chapter 28, Health and Sanitation. The amendments increase permit fees for all permanent food establishments and private sewage disposal systems by 3%. This increase is submitted in conjunction with the 2007 Health Department budget approved by the Finance Committee on October 17<sup>th</sup>. The McLean County Board of Health approved the ordinance change at its meeting of September 6<sup>th</sup>.

In addition, the McLean County Board's Resolution Establishing the Budget Policy for Fiscal Year 2007, Section 12.22-2 User Fees and Charges states: "Every effort shall be made to identify and/or establish appropriate user fees for charges, as authorized by State law..." The adjustment in fees will help underwrite a portion of the increase in costs within the food and sewage programs. Currently, fees support 62% of the food sanitation program and 18% of the private sewage disposal program.

Subject: Third Quarter FY 2006 Risk Management Fund Report

For the third quarter in FY 2006, the County has experienced an increase of \$ 68,794 for incurred liability claims, \$ 142,772 incurred workers compensation claims, and \$ 4,628 for incurred auto physical damage claims, since the last quarter report of June 30, 2006 in its cumulative claims experience for all years since 1992. There were no changes in incurred losses for auto liability claims. For general liability claims, the increase is due to the impact of the increase in compensation rate to outside counsel and increased while the increase in workers compensation costs is due to recognition of the adverse severity of the County's work injuries for FY 2006. The County's cumulative claims experience is summarized in Table 1.

For the third quarter experience of FY 2006, ten claims for the removal of road paint from vehicles accounted for the increase in general liability claims for the quarter, while there were 17 additional work injury claims. The overall claims experience for the quarter as compared to the same period ranks as the second highest in terms of claims count and highest in terms of incurred losses. A summary of the non-cumulative claims experience for the third quarter is included in Table 2.







In a ruling dated March 25, 1946, we held that the agencies and instrumentalities and all educational, charitable and religious institutions operated, supervised, or controlled by or in connection with the Roman Catholic Church Official Catholic Directory for 1946, are entitled to exemption from Federal income tax under the provisions of section 101(6) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1939, which corresponds to section 501(c)(3) of the 1954 Code. This ruling has been updated annually to cover the activities added to or deleted from the Directory.

The Official Catholic Directory for 1987 shows the names and addresses of all agencies and instrumentalities and all educational, charitable, and religious institutions operated by the Roman Catholic Church in the United States, its territories and possessions in existence at the time the Directory was published. It is understood that each of these is a nonprofit organization, that no part of the net earnings thereof inures to the benefit of any individual, that no substantial part of their activities is for promotion of legislation, and that none are private foundations under section 509(a) of the Code.

Based on all information submitted, we conclude that the agencies and instrumentalities and educational, charitable, and religious institutions operated, supervised or controlled by or in connection with the Roman Catholic Church in the United States, its territories or possessions appearing in the Official Catholic Directory for 1987 are exempt from Federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Code.

Donors may deduct contributions to the agencies, instrumentalities and institutions referred to above, as provided by section 170 of the Code. Bequests, legacies, devises, transfers, or gifts to them or for their use are deductible for Federal estate and gift tax purposes under sections 2055, 2106, and 2522 of the Code.

INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT TO FUND  
THE McLEAN, DeWITT AND LIVINGSTON COUNTIES  
EDUCATIONAL SERVICE REGION

WHEREAS, Section 3A-7 of the Illinois School Code (105 ILCS 5/3A-7) states that counties pay for the expenses of an Education Service Region in the proportion that the equalized and assessed valuation of the taxable property in the county bears to the total equalized and assessed valuation of all of the property in the region; and

WHEREAS, Article 7, Section 10(a) of the Illinois Constitution expressly permits local governments to enter into agreements to exercise, combine, or transfer any power or function not prohibited by law or ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the parties agree that each county has the power and duty to pay for the expenses of their Educational Service Region under Section 3A-7 of the Illinois School Code and that there are no laws or ordinances which prohibit them from entering into this Intergovernmental Agreement pursuant to the authority provided in the Illinois Constitution; and

WHEREAS, the parties agree that it is in the best interests of the citizens of McLean, DeWitt and Livingston Counties to remain as one Educational Service Region and provide oversight and funding for such Region in accordance with the terms of this agreement, now, therefore,

IT IS HEREBY AGREED by and between the County Boards of McLean, DeWitt and Livingston Counties as follows:

1. That the Joint Education Committee of McLean, DeWitt and Livingston Counties shall consist of the following members: three (3) members from McLean County, one (1) member from DeWitt County, and one (1) member from Livingston County.
2. That for the Educational Service Region's **2007-2008** fiscal year, McLean County shall contribute 66%, DeWitt County shall contribute 16% and Livingston County shall contribute 18% of the cost of defraying the expenses of the Educational Service Region.
3. That for the Educational Service Region's **2008-2009** fiscal year, McLean County shall contribute 66%, DeWitt County shall contribute 16% and Livingston County shall contribute 18% of the cost of defraying the expenses of the Educational Service Region.
4. That for the Educational Service Region's **2009-2010** fiscal year, McLean County shall contribute 67%, DeWitt County shall contribute 15% and Livingston County shall contribute 18% of the cost of defraying the expenses of the Educational Service Region.
5. That for the Educational Service Region's **2010-2011** fiscal year, McLean County shall contribute 68%, DeWitt County shall contribute 15% and Livingston County shall contribute 17% of the cost of defraying the expenses of the Educational Service Region.
6. That for the Educational Service Region's **2011-2012** fiscal year, McLean County shall contribute 69%, DeWitt County shall contribute 14% and Livingston County shall contribute 17% of the cost of defraying the expenses of the Educational Service Region.
7. That this agreement shall terminate December 31, 2012.

8. That this agreement may only be amended by agreement of all of the parties. Furthermore, by mutual consent of the parties, this agreement may be amended or terminated in the event consolidation or redistricting of this regional office of education occurs during the term of this agreement.
9. No waiver or breach of this agreement or any provision hereof shall constitute a waiver of any other or further breach of this agreement or any provision hereof.
10. This agreement is severable, and the invalidity, or unenforceability, of any provision of this agreement, or any party hereof, shall not render the remainder of this agreement invalid or unenforceable.
11. That the Intergovernmental Agreement to Fund the McLean, DeWitt and Livingston Counties Educational Service Region entered into prior to the date of this agreement shall terminate on December 31, 2006 and thereafter be replaced with this agreement.

**AN ORDINANCE REGULATING SMOKING IN PUBLIC PLACES  
AND PLACES OF EMPLOYMENT IN THE  
UNINCORPORATED AREAS OF McLEAN COUNTY**

WHEREAS, the City of Bloomington and Town of Normal have adopted strict no smoking ordinances to protect the health of their citizens; and

WHEREAS, secondhand smoke, which contains 4,000 chemicals, 63 of which cause cancer, is the third leading cause of preventable death in the United States, and the National Cancer Institute determined in 2000 (Monograph #10) that secondhand smoke is responsible for the early deaths of as many as 65,000 Americans annually; and

WHEREAS, numerous studies have found that tobacco smoke is a major contributor to indoor air pollution, and that breathing secondhand smoke (also known as environmental tobacco smoke) is a cause of disease in healthy nonsmokers, including heart, stroke, respiratory disease, and lung cancer; and

WHEREAS, the Public Health Service's National Toxicology Program has listed secondhand smoke as a known carcinogen (U. S. DHHS, 2000, citing Cal. EPA, 1997); and

WHEREAS, the ills of smoking and secondhand smoke are well documented in all of the independent medical studies and secondhand smoke is particularly hazardous to elderly people, individuals with cardiovascular disease, and individuals with impaired respiratory function, including asthmatics and those with obstructive airway disease; and

WHEREAS, children exposed to secondhand smoke have an increased risk of asthma, respiratory infections, sudden death syndrome, developmental abnormalities, and cancer; and

WHEREAS, the Americans with Disabilities Act, which requires that disabled persons have access to public places and workplaces, deems impaired respiratory function to be a disability; and

WHEREAS, (1) the U. S. Surgeon General has determined that the simple separation of smokers and nonsmokers within the same air space may reduce, but does not eliminate, the exposure of nonsmokers to secondhand smoke, (2) the Environmental Protection Agency has determined that secondhand smoke cannot be reduced to safe levels in businesses by high rates of ventilation, (3) air cleaners, which are only capable of filtering the particulate matter and odors in smoke, do not eliminate the known toxins in secondhand smoke, (4) American Society of Heating, Refrigerating and Air Conditioning Engineers (ASHRAE) bases its ventilation standards on totally smoke-free environments because it cannot determine a safe level of exposure to secondhand smoke, which contains cancer-causing chemicals, and ASHRAE acknowledges that the technology does not exist that can remove chemicals from the air that cause cancer; and

WHEREAS, a recently promulgated ASHRAE Position Document on Environmental Tobacco Smoke concludes that at present, the only means of eliminating health risks associated with indoor exposure is to ban all smoking activity; and

WHEREAS, the ASHRAE Position Document further concludes that no current ventilation, air cleaning or other technologies have been demonstrated to control health risks from environmental tobacco smoke exposure in spaces where smoking occurs; and

WHEREAS, a significant amount of secondhand smoke exposure occurs in the workplace, and employees who work in smoke-filled businesses suffer a 25-50% higher risk of heart attack and higher rates of death from cardiovascular disease and cancer, as well as increased acute respiratory disease and a measurable decrease in lung function; and

WHEREAS, smoke-filled workplaces result in higher worker absenteeism due to respiratory disease, lower productivity, higher cleaning and maintenance costs, increased health insurance rates and increased liability claims for diseases related to exposure to secondhand smoke; and

WHEREAS, numerous economic analyses examining restaurant and hotel receipts and controlling for economic variables have shown either no difference or a positive economic impact after enactment of laws requiring workplaces to be smoke-free; and

WHEREAS, creation of smoke-free workplaces is sound economic policy and provides the maximum level of employee health and safety; and

WHEREAS, smoking is a potential cause of fires, cigarette and cigar burns and ash stains on merchandise and fixtures and contributes to the economic damage of businesses; and

WHEREAS, on June 25, 2006, the Illinois Governor signed into law Senate Bill 2400 which gives non-home rule counties the ability to regulate smoking in public places and places of employment; and

WHEREAS, enacting an Ordinance Regulating Smoking in Public Places and Places of Employment in the Unincorporated Areas of McLean County will eliminate secondhand smoke exposure in all workplaces and public places including without limitation restaurants and bars; and

WHEREAS, the County Board of McLean County, Illinois finds and declares that the purposes of this Ordinance are (1) to protect the public health and welfare by prohibiting smoking in all public places and places of employment, and (2) to guarantee the right of nonsmokers to breathe smoke-free air which shall have priority over the desire to smoke; now, therefore,

**BE IT ORDAINED** BY THE COUNTY BOARD OF McLEAN COUNTY, ILLINOIS  
as follows:

The McLean County Code is hereby amended by adding a new Chapter 39 to read as follows:

**Section 39 - 1 Title.**

This Chapter shall be known as the Regulation of Smoking in Public Places and Places of Employment.

**Section 39 - 2 Definitions.**

The following words and phrases whenever used in Chapter shall have the following meanings:

“Adult Day Care Home” means a private residence which receives for care one or more aging or disabled adults, not related to the family.

“Business” means any sole proprietorship, partnership, joint venture, corporation, limited liability company or other business entity formed for profit-making purposes, including without limitation retail establishments where goods or services are sold as well as professional corporations and other entities where legal, medical, dental, engineering, architectural, or other professional services are delivered.

“Child Day Care Home” means a private residence which receives for care one or more children under the age of 12, not related to the family.

“Church” means a facility primarily and regularly used for religious worship or religious instruction.

“Employee” means any person who is employed by an employer in consideration for direct or indirect monetary wages or profit, and a person who volunteers his or her services for a non-profit entity.

“Employer” means any person, business, partnership, association, corporation, including without limitation a municipal corporation, trust, or non-profit entity that employs the services of one or more individual persons.

“Enclosed Area” means all space in any structure or building that is enclosed on all sides by any combination of walls, half walls, windows, or doorways extending from floor to the ceiling, regardless of whether they are open or closed.

“Facility” means any enclosed structure or building intended for human occupancy.

“Health care facility” means any office or institution providing care or treatment of diseases, whether physical, mental, or emotional, or other medical, physiological, or psychological conditions, including without limitation hospitals, rehabilitation hospitals, clinics, nursing homes, homes for the aging or chronically ill, laboratories, and offices of surgeons, chiropractors, physical therapists, physicians, dentists, and other specialists within these professions. This definition shall include all waiting rooms, hallways, private rooms, semi-private rooms and wards within health care facilities.

“Place of employment” means any enclosed area under the control of a public or private employer that employees frequent during the course of employment, including without limitation work areas, employee lounges, restrooms, conference rooms, classrooms, employee cafeterias, and hallways. A private residence is not a “place of employment” unless it is used as a child day care home, adult day care home, health care facility or home-based business of any kind open to the public.

“Private Club or Lodge” means an organization, whether incorporated or not, which is the owner, lessee, or occupant of a building or portion thereof used exclusively for club purposes at all times, which is operated solely for a recreational, fraternal, social, patriotic, political, benevolent, or athletic purpose, but not for pecuniary gain, and if alcoholic beverages are sold such sale is incidental to its operation. The affairs and management of the organization are conducted by a board of directors, executive committee, or similar body chosen by the members at an annual meeting. The organization has established bylaws and/or a constitution to govern its activities. The organization has been granted an exemption from the payment of federal income tax as a club under 26 U.S.C. Section 501.

“Public place” means any enclosed area to which the public is invited or in which the public is permitted, including without limitation banks, any business, educational facilities, government buildings, health care facilities, laundromats, museums, public transportation facilities, reception areas, restaurants, bars/taverns, retail food production and marketing establishments, retail service establishments, retail stores, service line, shopping malls, sports arenas, theaters, waiting rooms and common areas in multiple family residences. A private residence is not a “public place” unless it is used as a child day care home, adult day care home, health care facility or home-based business of any kind open to the public.

“Retail tobacco store” means any retail store utilized primarily for the sale of tobacco products and accessories and in which the sale of other products is merely incidental and where no one under 18 is permitted.

“Service line” means any indoor line at which one (1) or more persons are waiting for or receiving services of any kind, whether or not the service involves the exchange of money.

“Shopping mall” means any enclosed walkway or hall area that serves to connect retail or professional establishments.

“Smoking” means inhaling, exhaling, burning or carrying any lighted cigar, cigarette, pipe, hookah or other lighted tobacco product in any manner or in any form.

“Sports Arena” means any enclosed sports pavilion, stadium, gymnasium, health spa, boxing arena, swimming pool, roller and ice rink, bowling alley and other similar places where members of the general public assemble to participate in or witness sports, cultural, recreational or other events.

**Section 39 - 3 McLean County Owned Facilities.**

Smoking shall be prohibited in any McLean County government facility and any McLean County government vehicle, including without limitation facilities and vehicles owned, leased, or operated by McLean County government.

**Section 39 - 4 Prohibition of Smoking in Public Places and Places of Employment.**

Smoking shall be prohibited in all enclosed public places and places of employment within the unincorporated areas of McLean County, except as provided in Section 39 - 5.

**Section 39 - 5 Where Smoking is not Regulated.**

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Chapter to the contrary, the following enclosed indoor areas shall be exempt from the provisions of Section 39 - 4.

1. Private residences, except when used as a licensed child day care home, adult care home, health care facility, or a home-based business of any kind open to the public, provided, however, private sleeping rooms in nursing homes and assisted living centers are not subject to Section 39 - 4, unless a roommate objects to smoking in the room.
2. Hotel and motel sleeping rooms that are rented to guests and are designated as smoking rooms provided, however, that not more than twenty-five per cent (25%) of the rooms rented to guests in a hotel or motel may be so designated.
3. Retail tobacco stores, provided that smoke from these places does not infiltrate into areas where smoking is prohibited under the provisions of any section of this Chapter.
4. Private clubs or lodges.
5. Churches.

**Section 39 – 6 Declaration of Establishment as Non-Smoking.**

Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Chapter, an owner, operator, manager, or other person in control of any enclosed indoor area described in Section 39 – 5 may declare that entire indoor area as a non-smoking place.

**Section 39 - 7 Non-Retaliation.**

No person or employer shall discharge, refuse to hire, or in any manner retaliate against an employee, applicant for employment, or customer because that employee, applicant, or customer exercises any rights afforded by this Chapter or reports or attempts to prosecute a violation of this Chapter.

**Section 39 - 8 Enforcement.**

A. Notice of the provisions of this Chapter shall be given to all applicants for a liquor license in McLean County.

B. Any citizen who desires to register a complaint under this Chapter may file a police report with the McLean County Sheriff.

C. McLean County shall have the authority, while a public place or place of employment is undergoing an otherwise mandated inspection, to inspect for compliance with this Chapter.

D. An owner, manager, operator or employee of a public place or place of employment regulated by this Chapter shall inform persons violating this Chapter of the appropriate provisions thereof. The posting of a no smoking sign that conforms with this Chapter shall be considered adequate notice.

E. In addition to the remedies provided by this Chapter, the McLean County Board Chairman or any person aggrieved by the failure of the owner, operator, manager or other person in control of a public place or a place of employment to comply with the provisions of this Section may apply for injunctive relief to enforce those provisions in any court of competent jurisdiction.

**Section 39 - 9 Posting of Signs.**

Every public place and place of employment where smoking is prohibited by this Chapter, shall have posted at every public entrance a conspicuous sign clearly stating that smoking is prohibited. The international “no smoking” symbol consisting of a pictorial representation of a burning cigarette enclosed in a red circle with a red bar diagonally across it shall be considered acceptable under this Section.

### **Section 39 - 10 Violations and Penalties.**

A. A person who smokes in an area where smoking is prohibited by this Chapter shall be guilty of an infraction, punishable by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) nor more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00).

B. A person who owns, manages, operates or otherwise controls a place subject to this Chapter and who fails to prohibit smoking shall be guilty of an infraction, punishable by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) nor more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00).

An owner, manager, operator or person in control of a place subject to this Chapter shall be deemed to have permitted a violation of the Chapter if a violation has occurred while the owner, manager, operator or person in control is physically present at the location at the time of the violation. It shall be a defense to this charge that the owner, manager, operator or person in control of the premises has told the smoking offender that smoking is prohibited, and if the smoker does not stop smoking, the owner, manager, operator or person in control has called the McLean County Sheriff's Department at the time of the violation and reported the refusal to comply with the Ordinance.

C. A person who owns, manages, operates or otherwise controls a place subject to this Chapter and who fails to post a sign in conformance with the provisions of this Division shall be guilty of an infraction punishable by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) nor more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00).

D. Each day on which a violation of this Chapter occurs shall be considered a separate and distinct violation.

### **Section 39 - 11 Public Education.**

McLean County, through the McLean County Health Department, shall engage in a continuing program to explain and clarify the purposes and requirements of this Chapter to citizens affected by it, and to guide owners, operators, and managers in their compliance with it.

### **Section 39 - 12 Other Applicable Laws.**

This Chapter shall not be interpreted or be construed to permit smoking where it is otherwise restricted by other applicable laws.

### **Section 39 - 13 Severability.**

If any provision, clause, sentence or paragraph of this Chapter or the application thereof to any person or circumstances shall be held invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity shall not affect the other provisions of this Chapter which can

be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Chapter are declared to be severable.

**Section 39 - 14 Effective Date.**

That this Ordinance shall take effect January 1, 2007.

**Section 39 - 15 Date of Adoption.**

Highlights of the Recommended Budget

REVENUE:

415.0001 Interest on Investments: This revenue line item account has increased from \$130,000 in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget to \$380,000 in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget. This increase reflects the consolidation of the following line-item accounts – Interest on Money Market Accounts, Interest on Illinois Public Funds, Interest on Sweep Accounts, Interest on Merrill Lynch – into one single account. This increase is attributable to the Federal Reserve Bank's policy of raising the fed rate and the resulting increase in interest rates on money market accounts and certificates of deposit.

415.0003 Costs/Interest on Delinquent Taxes: This revenue line item account has increased from \$440,000 in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget to \$500,000 in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget. This increase is based on a review of the actual revenues received in FY'2005 (\$491,529).

415.0400 Interest on Certificates of Deposit: This revenue line item account has increased from \$85,000 in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget to \$150,000 in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget. This increase is based on the higher interest rates on Certificate of Deposit investments offered by financial institutions.

Personnel:

There is no change in the staffing level in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget.

Materials and Supplies:

All Materials and Supplies line item accounts in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget have been budgeted at the same level or less as in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget with the following exceptions:

620.0001 Operating/Office Supplies: This line item account has increased from \$1800 in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget to \$1900 in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget. This increase is based on a review of last year's actual expenses.

621.0001 Non-Major Equipment: This line item account has increased from \$1000 in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget to \$2000 in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget. This increase is based on the need to purchase a Drop-Lock safe for the Office.

628.0001 Copy/Microfilm Expenses: This line item account has increased from \$250 in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget to \$300 in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget. This increase is based on a review of the actual year-to-date expenses as of the date the Recommended Budget was prepared.

Contractual:

All Contractual line item accounts in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget have been budgeted at the same levels or less as in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget with the following exceptions:

701.0001 Advertising/Legal Notices: This line item account has increased from \$3500 in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget to \$3800 in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget. This increase is based on the cost for publication of the delinquent property tax rolls as required by Illinois law.

706.0001 Contract Services: This line item account has increased from \$5000 in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget to \$5700 in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget. This increase is for the contract with Loomis Armored Car Services for the daily pick-up at the Treasurer's Office.

718.0001 Schooling & Conferences: This line item account has increased from \$1500 in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget to \$1750 in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget. Highlights of the Recommended Budget

REVENUE:

410.0029 Recording Fees: This revenue line-item account has been budgeted in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget at the same amount as in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget - \$600,000. This is based on a review of last year's actual revenues and the year-to-date revenue (\$382,108) received as of the date the Recommended Budget was prepared.

410.0032 Sales of Revenue Stamps: This line item account has increased from \$375,000 in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget to \$425,000 in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget. This is based on a review of last year's actual revenues and the year-to-date revenue (\$345,655) received as of the date the Recommended Budget was prepared.

410.0195 Rental Housing Support: This revenue line item account was added in FY'2005 to account for the County's share of the new fee that is being collected pursuant to Public 94-0118. The Recorder's Office is permitted to retain \$1.00 of this new fee.

There is no change in the FTE staffing level in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget.

Materials and Supplies:

All Materials and Supplies line item accounts have been budgeted in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget at the same level or less as in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget with the following exceptions:

620.0001 Operating/Office Supplies: This line item account has increased from \$2000 in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget to \$2200 in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget. This increase is based on a review of last year's actual expenses and the year-to-date expenses as of the date the Recommended Budget was prepared.

621.0001 Non-Major Equipment: This line item account has increased from \$ 0 in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget to \$400 in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget. This increase is offset by a \$400 reduction in the Books/Videos/Publications line item. The Recorder's Office would rather have the funds budgeted in this line item account for specific needs that arise in the office during the year.

628.0001 Copy/Microfilm Expenses: This line item account has increased from \$2500 in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget to \$3500 in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget. This increase is based on a review of last year's actual expenses and the need to send more records to be microfilmed and copied/stored on disk.

Contractual:

All Contractual line item accounts have been budgeted in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget at the same level or less as in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget with the following exceptions:

715.0001 Dues and Memberships: This line item account has increased from \$900 in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget to \$950 in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget. This increase is based on a review of the year-to-date expenses as of the date the Recommended Budget was prepared.

718.0001 Schooling & Conferences: This line item account has increased from \$4400 in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget to \$5000 in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget. This increase is based on attending the following workshops and conferences: State Association spring meeting in Springfield and the fall meeting in Chicago; NACo Legislative and Annual Conference; Property Industry Records Association. This will benefit the Recorder's Office by providing opportunities for

Highlights of the Recommended Budget:

The Recorder's Document Storage Fund 0136 is a Special Revenue Fund that has been established to properly account for the receipt and expenditure of the Document Storage Fees assessed and collected by the Recorder's Office. As a Special Revenue Fund, the Fund must be balanced by using the fees collected and the available Fund Balance.

REVENUE:

410.0089 Document Storage Fees: This revenue line item account has been budgeted at \$120,000 in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget. This is the same dollar amount that was approved in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget. This amount reflects the projected number of documents to be recorded in FY'2007. This reflects the reduction in the number of refinancings as mortgage interest rates have increased during the past year.

400.0000 Unappropriated Fund Balance: This revenue line item account has decreased from \$322,406 in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget to \$297,464 in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget. This decrease is attributable to the proposed document storage programs to be scheduled in FY'2007. The County Recorder plans to continue two programs begun in 2006 to preserve and inventory microfilm and to preserve/bind historic books retained by the office. Per the outside auditor's Fiscal Year 2005 audit, the end of year fund balance as of December 31, 2005, totaled \$629,488.00.

All Contractual line item accounts have been budgeted in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget at the same level or less as in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget with the following exceptions:

706.0001 Contract Services: This line item account has increased from \$5000 in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget to \$100,000 in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget. This increase reflects the continuation of the 2005-2006 project to digitize the records in the office in order to make them available via the Internet. The total projected expense in FY'2007 is split between this line item account and the Non-Contractual Services line item account.

750.0004 Software License Agreement: This line item account has increased from \$21,000 in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget to \$23,000 in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget. This line-item account includes the software license agreement for the Cott system and the possible addition of a new software license to be added at mid-year.

773.0001 Non-Contractual Services: This line item account has decreased from \$210,000 in the FY'2006 Adopted Budget to \$75,000 in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget. This amount is budgeted to permit the Recorder's Office to continue two programs in 2006 to preserve and inventory microfilm and to preserve/bind historic books retained by the office. The total projected expense in FY'2007 is split between this line item account and the Contractual Services line item account.

REVENUE:

410.0181 GIS Document Fee: This revenue line item account has been established in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget to account for the \$4.00 GIS fee collected by the Recorder to support the Countywide GIS development project. This revenue line item account has been budgeted at \$220,000.00 (55,000 documents X \$4.00/document).

EXPENDITURES:

500.0000 Budget Balance Account: Pursuant to the Intergovernmental Agreement approved by the Regional Planning Commission and the County Board, 10% of the total receipts are to be held by the County Treasurer's Office to pay for any bank service charges or other indirect costs incurred by the County.

0980.0181 GIS Fees: This line item account has been established in the FY'2007 Recommended Budget to account for the GIS fees to be paid to the Regional Planning Commission. Pursuant to the Intergovernmental Agreement approved by the Regional Planning Commission and the County Board, \$4.00 of the \$5.00 GIS fee collected by the Recorder's Office shall be remitted to the Regional Planning Commission to support the Countywide GIS development project.

**Re:** Request to Approve Recommendations for Position Reclassifications



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Elected Officials, departments and agencies submitted 11 reclassification requests covering 12 incumbent employees as part of the Fiscal Year 2007 budget process. As we have done every year since the 2001 budget, we used the Position Appraisal Method (PAM) system developed by Public Administration Service, Inc. (PAS) to evaluate all requests.

We recommend one position be upgraded by two pay grades, five positions be upgraded by one pay grade and five positions remain in their current classification. The costs for each of the recommended reclassifications are included in the County Administrator's Recommended Budget for FY 2007.

Attached for your review and consideration is a summary listing of the FY 2007 requests and our recommendations. Also attached is a matrix listing all current County positions and their respective PAM scores. A 14 page summary of the PAM system, including definitions of each of the seven factors and all of the degrees within each factor, is also available for your review.

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1                   CHAIRMAN SORENSEN: Thank you very much  
2 for coming to the public hearing this evening. The  
3 Finance Committee of the McLean County Board will  
4 now convene a public hearing to gather public input  
5 and comments regarding the proposed ordinance  
6 regulating smoking in public places and places of  
7 employment and the unincorporated areas of McLean  
8 County. There are in addition to the Finance  
9 Committee members here, I will introduce other  
10 County Board members who are present this evening.

11                   At my extreme right is Mr. Don Cavallini  
12 who represents this district of the County Board.  
13 To his left, Stan Hoselton who represents this  
14 district. Duane Moss is a member of the Finance  
15 Committee. To my immediate right, Ben Owens is a  
16 member of the Finance Committee, and our incognito  
17 chairman of the County Board is hiding back there.  
18 Thank you for joining us.

19                   Because there are six members of the  
20 McLean County Board present, which represents a  
21 majority of a quorum of the complete County Board,  
22 members of the board who are not members of the  
23 Finance Committee will not be permitted to speak  
24 this evening but are here to listen and gather the

1 same input with the same level of interest that the  
2 Finance Committee has. So please do not be  
3 offended if some of our members choose not to  
4 speak. It's because they are limited by state law  
5 and may not speak.

6 With that, the members of the Finance  
7 Committee wish to make sure everybody understands  
8 that we are not doing this as an opportunity for  
9 debate or back and forth dialog. Members of the  
10 committee may ask clarifying questions from time to  
11 time, but we're trying to remain as civil as we  
12 possibly can. We understand this is a highly  
13 contentious issue, but we're going to do our best  
14 to be open-minded and gather input on both sides of  
15 the issue, and we would hope that everybody else  
16 would join us in that charge.

17 With that, there's a sign-up sheet on  
18 the back table for anyone who wishes to present  
19 oral comment or submit written comments to the  
20 Finance Committee for the record. Complete copies  
21 of the ordinance are available on the County's  
22 website or via request of the County  
23 Administrator's office. And the telephone number  
24 of the administrator's office is area code

1 (309)888-5110.

2 Also in the public record previously was  
3 a listing of all of the addresses that would be  
4 affected by this ordinance should it go in --  
5 become an ordinance. There are somewhere between  
6 253 and 263 addresses that we are aware of. These  
7 are all rural addresses not in any incorporated  
8 areas of the county. They all have buildings on  
9 them and are zoned manufacturing, agriculture, or  
10 commercial.

11 So with that, we will start into the  
12 list of people who have signed up as they had come  
13 in. The first person to present testimony is Terry  
14 Harris who would like to present written testimony.  
15 Terry, are you in a position to give that to us  
16 now, or do you want to send that?

17 MR. HARRIS: No, I will do that. I have  
18 not done that yet.

19 CHAIRMAN SORENSEN: Mr. John Anderson  
20 would like to present oral comments. Mr. Anderson?

21 MR. ANDERSON: Do I just do it right here?

22 CHAIRMAN SORENSEN: To the microphone,  
23 please. For the record, we are transcribing the  
24 events of this meeting. I'm going to ask that

1 everyone presenting testimony please clearly state  
2 your name and your address for the recording  
3 process of the meeting and then please continue  
4 with your comments.

5 MR. ANDERSON: Okay. John W. Anderson. I  
6 live at 25225 I believe is the address, I usually  
7 use a P.O. Box 56, in Lexington. I'm a business  
8 owner, and I'm a smoker. But what bothers me about  
9 this to begin with is if a business owner wants to  
10 make a place nonsmoking, I've not got a problem  
11 with that. But when I'm the one paying the taxes  
12 and the bills and the payments and stuff on a piece  
13 of real estate, I feel that that belongs to me and  
14 the bank or whoever. And I feel that when  
15 government steps in and tells me what exactly I  
16 have to do in this business, I mean we've got lots  
17 of regulations, some we like, some's good, some's  
18 bad, but I personally believe that that is not  
19 right for government to tell us that we can't have  
20 smoking in our place of business. That's the only  
21 problem I've got with it.

22 I realize it's all bad for our health  
23 and maybe for people that comes in. But, you know,  
24 personally, we don't smoke in our office, you know,

1 when people come in. We don't have that go on.  
2 But in the back, the guys smoke, I smoke. And I  
3 just don't feel it's right that somebody can tell  
4 us that we can't do that in our establishment. We  
5 are paying the taxes helping keep government going.  
6 And I'm beginning to think my mother was right  
7 years ago when she says one of these days, you'll  
8 have to have a triple 6 taped on you somewhere in  
9 order to buy or sell anything. That's about all  
10 I've got to say. Thank you.

11 CHAIRMAN SORENSEN: Mr. Anderson, I think  
12 at least one member of the committee has a question  
13 for you.

14 MR. OWENS: What kind of business are you  
15 in?

16 MR. ANDERSON: In an autobody and truck  
17 repair facility.

18 MR. OWENS: Is this business on -- like in  
19 the back of your property by your house, or is on  
20 it on separate --

21 MR. ANDERSON: No, it's right here in  
22 Lexington right off Old 66.

23 MR. OWENS: All right. Thank you very  
24 much.

1 CHAIRMAN SORENSEN: Are there any other  
2 questions? Thank you, Mr. Anderson. Robert  
3 Williams?

4 MR. WILLIAMS: I'll pass at this time.

5 CHAIRMAN SORENSEN: Mike Holder has asked  
6 to present written comments. Mr. Holder, do you  
7 have your comments with you?

8 MR. HOLDER: No, I don't. I'll make an  
9 oral comment.

10 CHAIRMAN SORENSEN: Oral? Please.

11 MR. HOLDER: Mike Holder, owner of Green  
12 Gables. I just recently went through a lot of  
13 changes to create a nonsmoking area, air  
14 ventilation, and have smoking all over in the bar  
15 area so that I could service both people, but I  
16 have employees that are working for me because they  
17 can smoke there. Now if they can go three miles  
18 down the road to Hudson and work there and still  
19 smoke or smoke in any other city areas, I don't --  
20 I don't think that's fair. I was hoping that when  
21 they did it in town, we'd maybe recover some of the  
22 loss of business from the high gas prices that kept  
23 people from coming out there. But if you're going  
24 to, you know, take that away, too, I mean we're

1 going to lose employees and business and more  
2 employees probably as a result. That's all I have  
3 to say.

4 CHAIRMAN SORENSEN: Are there any  
5 questions from the committee? I have a quick  
6 question if I might, Mr. Holder. How many  
7 employees do you have?

8 MR. HOLDER: 11. Generally 11, 12,  
9 sometimes 17. Depends on how busy.

10 CHAIRMAN SORENSEN: From what you know,  
11 could you estimate the percentage that are smokers?

12 MR. HOLDER: Probably 50 percent.  
13 Customers and employees.

14 CHAIRMAN SORENSEN: Customers and  
15 employees?

16 MR. HOLDER: There's a lot of people that  
17 don't smoke unless they are having a beer or two.  
18 Also, that would change that.

19 CHAIRMAN SORENSEN: Any other questions  
20 from the committee? Thank you, Mr. Holder. Doug  
21 Reiners?

22 MR. REINERS: Yes. My name is Doug  
23 Reiners. My address is 914 South Adelaide Street,  
24 and that's in Normal. I stand in front of you.

1 I'm not really here as anti-smoking or pro-smoking,  
2 but to me this is a property rights issue. A lot  
3 of people think of the Fifth Amendment to the  
4 Constitution as the right against  
5 self-incrimination, but the Fifth Amendment also  
6 guarantees you property rights, okay? And I don't  
7 understand for the life of me how you folks can  
8 feel that you can take something like this health  
9 issue, okay, and I'm not going to sit here and  
10 argue, I want to discuss the health issue aspect of  
11 it here momentarily, and elevate that above the  
12 rights of the property owners.

13 You have a person that they own the  
14 business, they own the building, they own the land,  
15 and you're going to tell them that they can't do  
16 something in there that's perfectly legal to do.  
17 You know, contrary to how some people feel, smoking  
18 is still legal, okay? And I'm not really  
19 pro-smoking or anti-smoking, but I'm certainly in  
20 support of property rights.

21 And I looked at this ordinance here. I  
22 printed this ordinance off from the website, and I  
23 started reading through it. I'm going to read  
24 something here. Whereas, secondhand smoke, which

1 contains 4,000 chemicals, 63 of which cause cancer,  
2 is the third leading cause of preventable death in  
3 the United States, and the National Cancer  
4 Institute determined in 2000 that secondhand smoke  
5 is responsible for the early deaths of as many as  
6 65,000 Americans annually.

7 Okay. That's what's in the document.  
8 So I went to the National Cancer Institute, and  
9 that is almost verbatim what's on there. But yet  
10 the very next paragraph says: Scientists do not  
11 know what amount exposure to secondhand smoke, if  
12 any, is safe. They don't know. So you've got an  
13 issue here that is at best -- the science is at  
14 best controversial, I mean; and at worst, it's  
15 voodoo science.

16 I don't know. I went out and I started  
17 looking at all the studies, and the studies are  
18 from one end of the spectrum to the other.  
19 Unfortunately, my printer died on me, and it didn't  
20 die because of secondhand smoke because I don't  
21 allow secondhand smoke in my house, okay? So that  
22 wasn't the reason my printer died.

23 There was a Canadian study that showed  
24 that secondhand smoke in certain amounts could

1 actually be healthy for you because it strengthens  
2 your immune system. Now whether or not I believe  
3 that, I don't know. But the analogy they drew was  
4 when you -- when you go to get a flu shot, they are  
5 basically introducing into your body some of the  
6 influenza virus. That was the analogy. Now I  
7 don't know. That may be voodoo science. I don't  
8 know. But it certainly showed me that there is  
9 something clear out here on the other side of the  
10 spectrum. And everything -- everything in this  
11 document here -- you know, and let's go on to the  
12 next one.

13 And another thing I guess that kind of I  
14 found a little bit disturbing was the National  
15 Cancer Institute has these -- it's a tip sheet for  
16 writers. Guess what shows up in the proposed  
17 ordinance there? Tip sheets. These people are  
18 anti-smoking. They are clear on this side of the  
19 issue. They aren't -- I mean their agenda is to  
20 basically make tobacco illegal. That's really what  
21 their agenda is. So these people definitely  
22 have -- when you -- when you when you make  
23 reference to the National Cancer Institute, that's  
24 what their business is. What would you expect to

1 come from them? Okay?

2 Okay. Let's take this a step further.  
3 In that was referenced a study for the National  
4 Library of Medicine. And that was referenced from  
5 the National Cancer Institute document that I just  
6 showed there. It's says: Self-reported proximity  
7 to smokers was supported by ITETS and ETS being  
8 environmental tobacco smoke, okay? Concentrations  
9 determined from the personal monitors but only to a  
10 modest extent. Although smoking was completely  
11 unrestricted inside the main office areas of the  
12 facility, ETS levels either aerial or from personal  
13 exposure measurements were lower than those  
14 estimated by Occupational Safety and Health  
15 Administration to be present in such facilities.

16 This study was a study done by two  
17 gentlemen, the Chemical and Analytical Sciences  
18 Division of Oak Ridge National Laboratory in Oak  
19 Ridge, Tennessee. Now I would think this here  
20 being from Tennessee, Tennessee is guess what? A  
21 tobacco state. So does that really surprise me?  
22 No, not a whole lot. Okay?

23 But let's go on down here to the Public  
24 Health Service National Toxicology Program has

1 listed secondhand smoke as a known carcinogen,  
2 okay? So they put that in there. So I went to the  
3 website, pulled up National Toxicology Program.  
4 And is secondhand smoke listed? Yes, secondhand  
5 smoke is listed.

6 But let me -- there's 248 substances  
7 that they listed in addition to secondhand smoke.  
8 You've got Alpha toxins, okay? Those can be  
9 present in soybeans, okay? You've got ether.  
10 That's used in the automotive industry, starting  
11 cars, stuff like that. You've got coal tars and  
12 coal tar pitches. That's used in roofing systems,  
13 things of that nature. You've got coal emissions.  
14 You can get that from coal burning stoves. You've  
15 got diesel exhaust particulates, okay? You've got  
16 formaldehyde gas. That's used in a lot of  
17 different industrial applications. You've got  
18 glass wool. That's fiberglass insulation. You've  
19 got neutrons. That's from an electrostatic  
20 generator. There's quite of a few of those used in  
21 industrial applications. You've got urethane used  
22 in wood finishing. You've got wood dust, which is  
23 in wood shops. There was even one in here soots,  
24 for example, and smokeless tobacco, and

1 environmental tobacco smoke. I'd like to find it  
2 here if I can. I may not have marked it. But it  
3 also says alcohol consumption is a known  
4 carcinogen.

5 And in one of my conversations with a  
6 board member, I asked it was Mr. Moss, Duane Moss,  
7 I said where do these -- where do you stop with  
8 this? His response was: I don't know. And you  
9 know what? That frightens me. When somebody tells  
10 me in government that they don't know where this  
11 stops -- isn't -- you know, I don't allow smoking  
12 in my house, but that's my choice. You know, and  
13 to me, you guys are taking an issue and you are  
14 just raising it way above the property rights of  
15 the owners. And I just -- I think that's terrible.

16 The other thing that was mentioned in  
17 here was from the -- let me get it here. Just a  
18 moment. It's the ASHREE, which I think is the  
19 Association of Heating, Refrigeration, and  
20 Air-Conditioning Engineers or something like that.  
21 It was mentioned in here, okay, about banning  
22 smoking, okay? And it -- and I went and pulled  
23 that document.

24 In here, it says: Smoking only in

1 isolated rooms. They said: Allowing smoking only  
2 in separate isolated rooms dedicated to smoking can  
3 control ETS exposure in nonsmoking spaces in the  
4 same building.

5 But that wasn't mentioned in here, you  
6 know. So to me, this document is -- has become  
7 very one-sided. And -- and if I didn't know  
8 better, I mean it's like -- and I don't know if --  
9 does anyone know? Has like anti-smoking  
10 organizations from outside McLean County tried to  
11 influence any of you? No? I don't know. I mean I  
12 have heard that they have. I don't know if they  
13 have or not.

14 But to go on, it says: Effective  
15 isolation is achievable through airflow and  
16 pressure control through the location of supply  
17 outlets and return and exhaust air inlets to  
18 preserve desirable airflow directions, doorways, as  
19 well as the use of separate ventilation systems  
20 serving the smoking spaces. When using this  
21 approach to design operation, you need to address  
22 entrainment of exhaust air containing ETS and  
23 noxious in the area of the system, in the air  
24 intake, windows, and other airflow has in addition,

1 the air tightness of the physical barriers between  
2 the smoking and nonsmoking area as well as  
3 connecting doorways require special attention.  
4 Some smoking areas in airports or office buildings  
5 exemplify use of this control approach.

6 CHAIRMAN SORENSEN: Sir, excuse me. I'm  
7 going to have to ask you to slow down. You are  
8 outpacing our court reporter.

9 MR. RUUD: Her fingers are on fire.

10 CHAIRMAN SORENSEN: I know this because  
11 our State's Attorney, Eric Ruud, keeps getting  
12 kicked. When I hear him grunt, that means you are  
13 talking too fast.

14 MR. RUUD: Thank you.

15 MR. REINERS: I apologize. But I mean in  
16 the very document that's referenced in the  
17 proposal, the ordinance, the proposed ordinance,  
18 it's like they cherry-picked the parts out of this,  
19 you know, which -- I guess I find that somewhat  
20 disturbing. And I -- I pulled some other, I guess,  
21 studies that suggest that -- that it may not be as  
22 bad as, you know, the gloom and doom that some of  
23 these studies do suggest.

24 I'm not saying that secondhand smoke

1 isn't bad for you. I don't know. You know. I  
2 know my grandfather who smoked all of his life, you  
3 know, he died when he got hit by a semi at 84 years  
4 old. His wife, who lived with him for sixty-some  
5 years, you know, and he smoked pretty much all the  
6 time, lived to be 95 or 6, I believe, you know.

7 I mean I only know what I see. I don't  
8 know. Maybe secondhand smoke is bad for you. But  
9 to elevate it above the property rights of the  
10 property owner I think is atrocious. I just -- I  
11 don't know. And I'm really saddened by that.

12 And I wanted to finish this by reading  
13 something. This came from a gentleman by the name  
14 of Robert Proctor who is a professor of history  
15 science, Department of History, Penn State  
16 University. And this -- this -- what I gleaned  
17 this from had nothing to do with smoking per se.  
18 But he was talking about a significant figure in  
19 the history of the world. And this person -- I  
20 want to read it without telling you who the person  
21 is, and then I'll tell you who it is.

22 He characterized tobacco as the wrath of  
23 the red man against the white man, vengeance for  
24 having been given hard liquor. He went on to say

1 in a public speech, he said: Every brother has a  
2 national duty to abstain from tobacco. The  
3 government must take the charge to ban smoking in  
4 government offices, civic transports, university  
5 campuses, rest homes, post offices, restaurants and  
6 bars, hospital grounds, and workplaces.

7 Furthermore, we must restrict or eliminate tobacco  
8 advertising, increasingly restrict and regulate  
9 tobacco farmers growing abilities, and engage in a  
10 public relations campaign to stamp out this evil.  
11 This issue is of such national importance that it  
12 must be done without deference to any and all  
13 rights accorded to any and all people.

14 Anyone want to take a guess who those  
15 words were -- who spoke those words in a speech?  
16 That was Adolf Hitler in 1939. Thank you.

17 CHAIRMAN SORENSEN: Thank you, Mr.  
18 Reiners. Are there any questions from the  
19 committee? Thank you, sir. Again, I'll point out  
20 at the back table. There's a sign-up sheet for  
21 anyone wishing to present testimony either orally  
22 or written. The next person on the list is Scott  
23 Tuggle.

24 MR. TUGGLE: Scott Tuggle, 111 South Orr

1 in Normal, Illinois, Kicks Bar and Grill, Towanda.  
2 We did a survey when Bloomington was trying to pass  
3 the smoking ban as far as Bloomington goes, we did  
4 a survey in Towanda of our customers for a month  
5 long period. We had a couple questions. We had  
6 three or four questions. One of the questions  
7 were: Do you smoke? 62 percent of them smoked.  
8 The other question was: Smoking ban in bars and  
9 restaurants. 84 percent said no. We had a  
10 question saying: Is it up to government to  
11 determine whether you should go nonsmoking or not  
12 or smoking? 94 percent, it was not up to  
13 government. It should be up to the business owner  
14 himself.

15 They have the right to come in or not  
16 come in. If you have smoking, they don't like  
17 smoking, then don't come in. I'm basing this on my  
18 customers. I want my customers to keep coming  
19 back. Granted, I'd like to have more customers.  
20 But let's keep my customers happy the way they are  
21 right now. I'm happy with what I've got right now.

22 And basically, that's just what I want  
23 to say about that. Any questions?

24 CHAIRMAN SORENSEN: Thank you, sir.

1 MR. SELZER: Just for clarification, you  
2 did the survey --

3 MR. TUGGLE: At Kicks in Towanda.

4 MR. SELZER: Okay. Your customers?

5 MR. TUGGLE: My customers. My customer  
6 base, yes.

7 MR. OWENS: This was for one month. And  
8 I'm assuming that once they filled out a survey,  
9 they weren't able to fill out another one so that  
10 like I wouldn't be able to come in every day and  
11 fill out a survey, correct?

12 MR. TUGGLE: Actually, no. Everybody  
13 filled it out every day. It was from regular  
14 customers every day.

15 MR. OWENS: I mean the same customers?

16 MR. TUGGLE: Yes. Oh, yes, definitely.  
17 Thank you.

18 CHAIRMAN SORENSEN: Thank you, Mr. Tuggle.  
19 The last person that we have signed up for comment  
20 this evening is Glenn Ingle. Is that correct, sir?  
21 Please.

22 MR. INGLE: Glenn Ingle. My address is  
23 31463 Burt Street, Chenoa, but I don't live in  
24 Chenoa. We live in Meadows. That's probably a

1 place that a lot of you don't even know where it  
2 is. I have a question. I didn't get to read the  
3 ordinance. What I would like to know is how they  
4 intend to enforce this ordinance if it passes.

5 And I'm involved right now with an  
6 ordinance that the county has, and I'm not getting  
7 anywhere with it. I have been with it for over a  
8 year, and I haven't got anything done, and it's  
9 just sitting there. I'd like to see something done  
10 with my ordinance, and I'd like to see something --  
11 how you are going to enforce this ordinance. I see  
12 you are going to hire some more people for the  
13 State's Attorney's Office in places, but I don't  
14 know if that's going to do it. Who is going to  
15 enforce this thing, go out there and see that old  
16 man 75 years old sitting out in front of the  
17 Meadows Retirement Community smoking a cigarette?  
18 I don't know how they are going to get away with  
19 that. Thank you.

20 CHAIRMAN SORENSEN: Mr. Ingle, I'll start  
21 by simply saying those are questions that the  
22 Finance Committee has surfaced over the last month  
23 or so as well. Eric, do you want to make a  
24 comment?

1 MR. RUUD: Well, we modeled this ordinance  
2 to fairly near what Bloomington and Normal have  
3 done to try to maintain as much consistency as  
4 possible. Both Bloomington's and Normal's  
5 ordinances state that their respective police  
6 departments will be in charge of enforcement. And  
7 to mirror that as best as we could, the county's  
8 proposed ordinance makes it the responsibility of  
9 the McLean County Sheriff to follow up on  
10 complaints. And those complaints will be treated  
11 the same as any other complaints that would come to  
12 the Sheriff's Department on other ordinance  
13 violations. So that's part of the reason why the  
14 Sheriff has that responsibility in this ordinance  
15 and that's because to try to be consistent with the  
16 ordinances that Bloomington-Normal have, we put it  
17 in the hands of the law enforcement. Thank you.

18 MR. HOLDER: Is the Sheriff's Department  
19 going to bring these people in for lighting up a  
20 cigarette?

21 THE WITNESS: I can't speak for the McLean  
22 County Sheriff, and he is not here.

23 CHAIRMAN SORENSEN: Any questions from the  
24 committee? Comments? No. Are there any other --

1 sir, please feel free to introduce yourself and  
2 begin.

3 MR. GILDERSLEEVE: My name is Ben  
4 Gildersleeve. I'm from Hudson. I own and operate  
5 Hazy Hills Golf Course. First off, I'd like it  
6 clearly understood that I smoked for 50 years, and  
7 nobody ever enjoyed it more than I did. Secondly,  
8 we've banned smoking in the clubhouse at Hazy Hills  
9 several years ago. I quit smoking myself about 15  
10 years ago or more.

11 The issue here, as I see it, is that I  
12 don't feel that you can legislate progress. I  
13 think people have to understand the errors of  
14 smoking and not be coerced into stopping. McLean  
15 County has a reputation of being overregulated.  
16 And I think this is a step in the wrong direction.  
17 I very strongly feel that it's an invasion of  
18 personal privacy to tell somebody what they can and  
19 can't do with their lives even though many of us  
20 realize that it's not the best thing to be doing.

21 I would suggest that regulating smoking  
22 might be no different than regulating whether or  
23 not we eat red meat. Some of us have levels of  
24 cholesterol that's too high, and it would be great

1 if we didn't have. But I don't think that it's the  
2 function for a county to tell us what's right and  
3 wrong in that regard.

4 I think smoking is the same way. I'm  
5 very strongly opposed to overregulation of things.  
6 And I think this is a step in that direction.  
7 Thank you.

8 CHAIRMAN SORENSEN: Are there any  
9 questions from the committee? Are there any  
10 other -- any other people present who would like to  
11 present comment? Please.

12 MS. FRANKLIN: Hi. My name is Kathy  
13 Franklin, and I live at 402 South Street in  
14 Lexington. I wasn't going to -- I came here to  
15 observe tonight and just to listen. And I hope  
16 everybody is kind to me when I leave here tonight.

17 I just wanted to address a couple things  
18 and just ask you to think about them.  
19 Respectfully, with the information brought here  
20 tonight, it is a health issue. It's not an  
21 annoyance issue. It's not -- and I can bring you  
22 and anybody that would like me to, I can provide  
23 stacks of scientific information, not voodoo  
24 medicine. I can bring you information from very

1 well-respected physicians. I can bring you all  
2 that information that we have presented before and  
3 to show you that secondhand smoke is a health  
4 issue.

5 And I do respect property rights. I do  
6 respect the entrepreneur that has his own business.  
7 But when we say that and property rights and paying  
8 taxes, I agree. But when we open it up and we have  
9 50 percent of the people that work for us or even  
10 one that does not smoke, that maybe is not carried  
11 on as a group that probably doesn't have health  
12 insurance through that or could be. But can they  
13 afford to take off? Can they afford to tell their  
14 boss I don't like smoke? Well, then their boss can  
15 say, well then, you need to find somewhere else.  
16 Can that person afford to say that? Can they say I  
17 don't have to have this paycheck? You know, we all  
18 know what it's like to need that paycheck. They  
19 know their kids are not going to work the second  
20 job or have to work to get me through college  
21 because this place has smoking? So, you know, we  
22 all do have rights. And I agree. For me, I can  
23 make the choice to walk in or walk out of anyplace  
24 that smokes. But do the other workers there, that

1 one, that waitress, that bartender, are they even  
2 going to tell their bosses as they stand up and say  
3 we want to smoke here that they don't agree with  
4 them? And who is going to protect them?

5 And there are regulations with property  
6 rights. There is the Health Department. There is  
7 how hot is your food. There is what are the other  
8 chemicals that you have in there. What are the  
9 other food issues? We all have regulations.

10 15 years ago, you could walk into a  
11 grocery store and light up in the produce  
12 department, the meat department, and everywhere  
13 else. Would you not be appalled right now if  
14 somebody was lighting cigarettes there? But it  
15 changes. We recognize the health issues and we  
16 change that.

17 I just ask you to think about that, see  
18 it as a health issue. It is. And look at the  
19 rights of all the people that work at all the  
20 places, even if there's only one, and see that they  
21 have the health insurance, see that they have the  
22 right to work in a smoke-free environment. Thank  
23 you.

24 CHAIRMAN SORENSEN: Thank you. Are there

1 questions from the committee? Is there anyone else  
2 present who would like to present comment at this  
3 meeting, oral or written?

4 None heard, this public hearing will  
5 adjourn until October 19th where it will reconvene  
6 at 7:00 p.m. at the Water Tower Place at 212 East  
7 Pine Street in LeRoy, Illinois. Thank you all for  
8 joining us.

1 MR. SORENSEN: All right. We'll go  
2 ahead and call the hearing to open -- we're  
3 actually reconvening this hearing from a previous  
4 public hearing on the topic that was held in  
5 Lexington a couple weeks ago. We'll start off by  
6 introducing the members of the Finance Committee,  
7 which is the hearing panel for this meeting. To  
8 my -- second to the left is Mr. Duane Moss. To  
9 my immediate left is Mr. Ben Owens, my immediate  
10 right is Mr. Dave Seltzer, and second to my right  
11 is our newest County Board member, Mr. John  
12 Butler.

13 Other County Board members, present to  
14 my extreme left are Cathy Ahart, to my extreme  
15 right, Chairman of the County Board, Michael  
16 Sweeney, and in the bottom of the room, not  
17 wanting to be recognized but we are anyway, Mr.  
18 Stan Hoselton.

19 I'm required by law to inform you that  
20 this meeting was posted as a public hearing with  
21 the Finance Committee as the hearing board, which  
22 means that the four members who are members of  
23 the Finance Committee, which are the four of us  
24 right here, are the ones who may engage in

1 conversation and ask questions of people  
2 presenting testimony. Other County Board members  
3 are here as observers only. If they ask  
4 questions, they may be in violation of the  
5 Illinois Open Meetings Act, so we're going to be  
6 careful about that.

7           With that, we'll reconvene the public  
8 hearing. We have a sign-up sheet of people who  
9 have requested to present. There's an additional  
10 sign-up sheet on this table up here if any member  
11 of the audience would like to sign up during the  
12 course of the hearing.

13           We'll start at the beginning. I'm going  
14 to ask that people presenting testimony clearly  
15 state your name and address and then proceed. If  
16 you're simply presenting written testimony,  
17 simply announce that and please pass it to our  
18 Assistant State's Attorney, Mr. Ruud.

19           Please, also, do not be offended, I may  
20 ask people to slow down speaking. We have a  
21 court reporter here this evening, Ms. Fran  
22 Anderson, and she's not close enough, but the  
23 typical response is if people begin to speak too  
24 fast Mr. Ruud gets kicked in the shins, he

1 groans, then I know people are speaking too fast.

2 So we're going to be cognizant of that so we  
3 make sure we're accurately recording this.

4 The statements and comments of this  
5 evening's meeting, along with any written  
6 testimony, will be included in a case file that  
7 will be reviewed by the Finance Committee prior  
8 to active committee discussion and the subsequent  
9 vote on November 7th at our regular Finance  
10 Committee meeting which will be held at the Law &  
11 Justice Center at four o'clock -- I'm sorry, the  
12 Government Center at four o'clock. With that,  
13 the first person who signed up to present  
14 testimony is Jackie Lanier.

15 MS. LANIER: Hi. My name is Jackie  
16 Lanier, and my address is 12 Berenz Place,  
17 Bloomington, speaking on behalf of the  
18 Bloomington-Normal Smoke-Free Coalition,  
19 Bloomington-Normal and McLean County Coalition.

20 First off, you know, just to kind of  
21 jump start this, we would encourage you guys to  
22 support a comprehensive smoke-free ordinance. We  
23 see that as the best thing for our community, for  
24 the health of our community, because, above all,

1 we see this as a public health issue, and the  
2 signs are very clear that secondhand smoke is a  
3 health issue.

4 If it wasn't clear before the Surgeon  
5 General's report, it is clear now, if not crystal  
6 clear. Health issues such as increasing the risk  
7 for cardiovascular disease, lung disease,  
8 increased risk for asthma attacks, ear infections  
9 in children, and there really is no safe level of  
10 secondhand smoke.

11 And I think, for a lot of us, we have  
12 the opportunity to work in smoke-free  
13 environments, and that's not true for some  
14 places, and this ordinance would allow that to  
15 happen. And I don't think -- I think when we  
16 think about it as a health issue, that's what we  
17 should keep at the forefront when we talk about  
18 this in this ordinance.

19 Really, eliminating smoking in indoor  
20 spaces is going to protect those people from  
21 exposure to secondhand smoke. Separating  
22 sections, ventilation systems really do not  
23 eliminate that risk of exposure to secondhand  
24 smoke. I think there has been in the past sort

1 of an issue of government infringing on  
2 businesses, and again, if we keep this to a  
3 public health issue, which, again, that's what we  
4 see that it is.

5 And as public officials there are laws  
6 in place, health codes, building codes, safety  
7 codes, that protect workers. And we see this in  
8 the same line as that, that this is going to be  
9 something that is going to be good for our  
10 community and protect those workers from  
11 secondhand smoke.

12 So I urge you on behalf of your  
13 constituents and this community to make this a  
14 healthier community. Join the thousands of other  
15 communities nationwide that have enacted  
16 smoke-free ordinances. There's 17 states now  
17 that have enacted smoke-free workplace  
18 ordinances. And if we look at those we know  
19 that, again, they saw it as a public health  
20 issue.

21 There's concern over economic issues,  
22 and there's studies out there that say it doesn't  
23 hurt economically-- if anything, it's a positive  
24 aspect for businesses and the community. So I

1 hope that you guys will consider this  
2 information.

3           There is tons of other health  
4 information that I could provide which I think  
5 that you have and you have heard on. But I think  
6 that if you look to the evidence, the evidence is  
7 there, and it's a public health issue. It's a  
8 safety issue. And as officials in government,  
9 you know, you can do that, that is your job, to  
10 enact laws to protect and safeguard the  
11 community.

12           So I thank you for your time.

13           MR. SORENSEN: Thank you very much. Are  
14 there any questions from the panel?

15           Mr. Fred Dodson?

16           MR. DODSON: My name is Fred Dodson, 632  
17 Mill Lane, Leroy, Illinois. There's two things  
18 we're talking about here, goods and services.  
19 How many of you people in the Council do  
20 services, how many do goods? You need a plumber,  
21 you need an electrician, you need something, it's  
22 a service. They come to your house. If you want  
23 goods, you go with people you're comfortable  
24 with.

1           Now, I don't know how many of you people  
2 employ people you write a paycheck for, but when  
3 it comes to goods you're going to go where you  
4 want to. It should be a power of choice. You  
5 should have a sign that says a smoking  
6 environment or nonsmoking environment. Because  
7 as people working, if you don't want to work  
8 here, we tell you the rules, you shouldn't have  
9 to work here. I call a plumber up, he wants to  
10 work in my house, he will, if he's does not, what  
11 is he going to tell me? I don't want to work in  
12 your house. Electrician, the same way.

13           Are you providing a good or a service?  
14 I mean, it's your choice. Don't punish people  
15 who smoke and don't punish people who don't  
16 smoke. If they don't like the place they go to,  
17 they don't have to go to it. If they don't like  
18 the plumber, electrician, the carpenter, they are  
19 not going to hire them back.

20           Thank you.

21           MR. SORENSEN: Are there any questions  
22 of the panel for Mr. Dodson?

23           Thank you, sir.

24           Mr. Steve Vollmer.

1 MR. VOLLMER: Steve Vollmer, 4306 North  
2 3200 East Road, West Township, Arrowsmith,  
3 Illinois.

4 Doggone it, Fred took my speech,  
5 basically. Gentlemen, ma'am, first of all, I  
6 would like to thank you for listening to us  
7 tonight. I really do appreciate that. I have no  
8 statistics whatsoever on whether smoking is good  
9 or bad. We've been told that it is so,  
10 therefore, I guess we must accept that it is.

11 But our country was founded on choice,  
12 okay? They founded this country because they  
13 wanted to choose a way of religion, a way of  
14 life. And this is the way it's been for a  
15 hundred years in our country. If you don't like  
16 Fords, buy a Dodge. If you don't like Chinese,  
17 eat Italian. It's about choice. If you want to  
18 smoke, that's your choice. If you don't want to  
19 smoke, that's also your choice.

20 There's a quote that says for those who  
21 fought for it, freedom has a flavor that the  
22 protected will never know. For anybody that's  
23 ever been in the military, you know exactly what  
24 I'm talking about. Personally, I feel like every

1 time I turn on the radio, turn on the television,  
2 or open the newspaper, my freedoms and privileges  
3 are slowly being taken away from me. Luckily, my  
4 rights cannot be touched because I am protected,  
5 at least that way. So I guess, gentlemen, ma'am,  
6 it's choice. Let the people decide.

7 I do smoke. It's a decision I made.  
8 It's a decision I'm sticking with. Eventually,  
9 it will probably kill me and I will leave behind  
10 a wife and children, grandchildren, and a  
11 sister. My choice. It's as simple as that. And  
12 when this first come before the Board, there is  
13 an article in the newspaper, I wish I could  
14 remember the gentleman's name that was on the  
15 Board, and I don't remember the quote word for  
16 word, but this gentleman said well, Bloomington  
17 banned smoking, Normal banned smoking, so we  
18 might as well go along with it. And for that I  
19 say shame, shame, shame on you. I wish I could  
20 remember who had that quote. Doesn't make me  
21 feel very confident that I'm being represented by  
22 somebody that would just follow along because  
23 somebody else already has this in motion.  
24 So I guess that's all I have to say.

1 MR. SORENSEN: Are there any questions  
2 of the panel of Mr. Vollmer?

3 MR. SELTZER: I do, because I don't  
4 think my position's a secret to anybody on the  
5 Board where I sit on the smoking issue. But how  
6 does someone who told me -- who served in the  
7 military and has a family and kids, I want to go  
8 to Schooners for a burger, I love it there, I  
9 think it's a cool place, but why should I have to  
10 go in there and smell someone else's smoke, to  
11 subject myself to that? Shouldn't I have a  
12 choice?

13 MR. VOLLMER: Yes, sir, you should.

14 MR. SELTZER: But is -- my only choice  
15 right now is either come in an unhealthy  
16 environment or you just don't get to go,  
17 whereas -- and I'm not trying to be a  
18 smartass --

19 MR. VOLLMER: No, I understand.

20 MR. SELTZER: -- I'm really trying to  
21 understand. So how do I get to take my son down  
22 to the pub and, you know, have a burger in the  
23 afternoon and watch a football game when you sit  
24 in a smoke-filled room? And I don't want to

1 subject my kids to that smoking environment. We  
2 work very hard to tell them not to smoke. So I  
3 guess I'm just curious as to how we find where  
4 does my choice come into play, then.

5 MR. VOLLMER: I understand. I  
6 understand what you're saying. And, Mr. Seltzer,  
7 I don't have an answer for you, except I guess we  
8 just keep nonsmoking areas and smoking areas, I  
9 guess. And I, too, have been -- even though I  
10 smoke and I know it sounds hypocritical about  
11 what I'm going to say, I have driven it into my  
12 children, you know, don't smoke, don't be like  
13 me.

14 Ma'am, gentlemen, I'll admit in front of  
15 everybody in this room it's the stupidest thing I  
16 ever did in my life, I admit it, but I do smoke.  
17 And that is the choice that I have made and I go  
18 with. And yes, sir, I do go into nonsmoking  
19 establishments to enjoy a meal with my family,  
20 too. So, you know, and I can wait an hour, hour  
21 and a half to get back into my vehicle and have  
22 my cigarette after I've eaten or, you know, so --  
23 okay.

24 MR. SELTZER: Thank you.

1 MR. VOLLMER: Thank you.

2 MR. SORENSEN: Any there other questions  
3 of Mr. Vollmer?

4 MR. DODSON: Yeah.

5 MR. SORENSEN: Mr. Dodson, if you'd like  
6 to ask a question, you'll have to return to the  
7 table.

8 MR. DODSON: I did not know that. No  
9 questions.

10 MR. SORENSEN: Any questions of Mr.  
11 Vollmer?

12 Thank you.

13 Also on the list is Rita Vollmer to  
14 present written testimony.

15 MR. VOLLMER: My wife is not feeling  
16 well tonight. She wrote some thoughts.

17 MR. SORENSEN: Eric will take it.

18 MR. VOLLMER: I'm not sure how many  
19 copies there are. So if there aren't enough  
20 copies to go around, my apologies.

21 MR. SORENSEN: No, that's fine. It will  
22 go in the file. We'll make copies.

23 MR. VOLLMER: Thank you.

24 MR. SORENSEN: Bobbie Lewis-Sibley.

1 MS. LEWIS-SIBLEY: Good evening. First  
2 off, I really want to thank you all for taking  
3 the time out of your schedules to actually --

4 MR. SWEENEY: Name and address?

5 MS. LEWIS-SIBLEY: Oh, I'm sorry.  
6 Bobbie Lewis-Sibley, 3115 Wild Horse Street in  
7 Normal, Illinois. Again, thank you for the time  
8 you have taken to go around McLean County and  
9 have these public input meetings. I think it's  
10 very forthcoming of you.

11 I may be beating a couple of people to  
12 the punching bag tonight so I'm just going to say  
13 a few things about some common themes that you've  
14 heard from the opposition against a smoke-free  
15 ordinance. One of those, which you've already  
16 heard this evening, is people have the right to  
17 smoke anywhere and anytime. I disagree. A  
18 smoker's right is no more above a nonsmoker's  
19 right. People have a right to breathe clean,  
20 smoke-free air. You're also going to hear,  
21 probably, tonight smoke-free laws are needless  
22 regulations, government interference. Smoke-free  
23 laws are public health laws similar to drunk  
24 driving, traffic, safe food and water laws. Most

1 County Board members take an oath to uphold the  
2 Illinois Constitution. In that preamble is to  
3 withhold and protect the health of constituents,  
4 and I truly believe that's part of your  
5 position.

6           You're also going to hear tonight to let  
7 the market, common sense, and courtesy dictate  
8 how people behave and not the government. Common  
9 sense tells us that people should not be exposed  
10 to a substance which is a proven carcinogen and  
11 increases the risk of heart attacks and strokes.  
12 It has been proven time and time again through  
13 many reputable studies that there is no safe  
14 level of exposure to secondhand smoke. You're  
15 also going to hear tonight that scientists are  
16 still debating the effects of secondhand smoke.  
17 I think the Surgeon General's report debunks  
18 that, more than enough evidence.

19           You're also going to hear tonight that  
20 smoke-free laws hurt businesses economically.  
21 Smoke-free laws are good for the bottom line. No  
22 reputable study has ever shown a negative  
23 economic impact. Many have shown a positive  
24 economic impact or have shown no impact at all.

1 In addition, decreased cleaning costs, decreased  
2 replacement of carpet and upholstery costs,  
3 decrease in employee absenteeism all affect the  
4 bottom line in a very positive way.

5           You're also going to hear tonight  
6 ventilation questions, comments; improved  
7 ventilation technology makes smoke-free policies  
8 unnecessary. ASHRE (phonetic) has already  
9 determined there is no ventilation system that  
10 can remove the carcinogens in the air.

11           You're also going to hear that smokers  
12 will flock to areas that do not have smoke-free  
13 laws. Nearly 80 percent of our population does  
14 not smoke. Reputable studies have shown that  
15 areas with smoke-free laws see increased business  
16 and surrounding areas see decreased business. In  
17 Illinois, only 8 percent of the population  
18 currently request the smoking section of a  
19 restaurant. We are not asking people to not  
20 smoke. We are only asking them to step outside.

21           Another exemption you might be asked to  
22 consider is that bars should be exempt from  
23 smoke-free laws. All people deserve health  
24 protection from toxic secondhand smoke which

1 causes heart disease. Those people who work in  
2 bars and go to bars are afforded the same rights  
3 as anyone else.

4 And just as a last comment, because I --  
5 the former gentleman, when all this started going  
6 on, my grandfather served in World War II and  
7 earned the Purple Heart. My father served in the  
8 Viet Nam war, and my brother was in Desert Storm.  
9 I've asked all three of them, and they never  
10 remember fighting for smoker's rights. So that's  
11 another thing you're going to hear, too, is our  
12 servicemen have fought for the right to smoke,  
13 and that's just not true.

14 MR. SORENSEN: Any questions of the  
15 panel for Ms. Lewis-Sibley?

16 Thank you very much.

17 Mr. John Kollross; did I pronounce that  
18 correctly, sir?

19 MR. KOLLROSS: Yes. Board members,  
20 appreciate your being here to listen to me --

21 MR. SORENSEN: Sir, name and address?

22 MR. KOLLROSS: John Kollross;  
23 K-o-l-l-r-o-s-s. My address is 26812, dash,  
24 U.S. Highway 150 in LeRoy.

1           I want to thank you guys for listening  
2 to us. I'm not very good at this. I've been  
3 dealing with the public in this area for ten  
4 years. I own a bowling alley on the outskirts of  
5 town here called Mustang Sally's, been there  
6 about ten years. I'm aware of lot of the health  
7 issues. I did 27,000 hours with the EMT service  
8 here in town, volunteer, so I've dealt with  
9 people that has trouble with cancer. A month  
10 after 911 my mom passed away of lung cancer; she  
11 smoked. Like I said, I understand a lot of the  
12 issues of the rights of the nonsmokers versus  
13 smokers.

14           As far as economic impact, that I just  
15 heard, for me, it would play a big part on my  
16 business. As far as percentages, over 50 percent  
17 in my place smoke. That's just in the bowling  
18 alley. I've got smoke eaters, which I heard  
19 earlier that they said that didn't extract  
20 everything out. I got an exhaust fan that I kick  
21 on often if I can sense that it's going to be  
22 smoky. I've got 14 employees there. They've  
23 never complained. I' very rarely hear of a  
24 bowler complaining of the -- of a smoke issue in

1 my place.

2           So as far as maybe some of the bigger  
3 houses in Bloomington-Normal, Champaign-Urbana,  
4 where they've got a hundred thousand people to  
5 choose from in new clients, it would be a little  
6 more difficult for myself, I think, to get that  
7 to happen.

8           I've always got a lot of young moms that  
9 bring the kids out to bowl, and the bar is  
10 separated from that aspect as far as my ability,  
11 along with the smoke eaters and all that. I've  
12 never heard any complaints in ten years. Some  
13 band nights might be getting a little smoky  
14 because there's 200 people in there, and I kick  
15 the exhaust fan on and it's gone.

16           My house is surrounded by -- now I'm  
17 getting into personal stuff -- but here awhile  
18 back when it wasn't cold enough for the heater  
19 and not warm enough for the AC they were spraying  
20 beans all around my house, and I chose to raise  
21 the windows, and eight foot from my bedroom  
22 window I could smell the chemicals all night.  
23 And my three-year-old's bedroom window is on the  
24 same side of the house. I ended up closing his.

1 We got to have these fertilizers, but they are  
2 not going to make them quit spraying, and that's  
3 a health issue.

4 I'll not mention any names, of course,  
5 but some of my clients that -- whether either the  
6 bar or the bowling alley, you know, they're  
7 already 50, 60 pounds overweight and they come up  
8 to the counter and they want two Snickers bars, a  
9 bag of chips, and a Butch's pizza, well, I don't  
10 have no right to tell them that that's not good  
11 for you, you know, of the fat content or  
12 whatever. So restaurants, and I don't have a  
13 restaurant out there, I can understand that. But  
14 the taverns, with proper ventilation at the  
15 bowling alleys and the owners use their  
16 discretion a little bit, that I could tell that  
17 I'm not going to put the little kids where the  
18 adults are smoking like a freight train, either.

19 I just wanted to give aspects of my  
20 personal belief on how it would affect me. I've  
21 already had over 40 percent of the bowlers tell  
22 me if McLean County passes this that they will  
23 not continue their bowling season, and that will  
24 be January. So I've gained some bowlers from

1 Bloomington-Normal bowling alleys because they're  
2 still allowed to smoke and they thought that  
3 maybe the county wouldn't do the same.

4           So -- and after all, and especially in a  
5 small town here, I mean, any population of 10,000  
6 are lucky to have a place for the kids to go.  
7 So, yeah, I might gain more kids by not allowing  
8 smoking out there, but as far as year-round  
9 economically for me, I would probably have to  
10 give it up and do something else again. I worked  
11 a lot of years in the oil fields of Texas, and  
12 I'm sure a lot of stuff I breathed on the rigs  
13 wasn't healthy for me, either, but that was our  
14 choice to work.

15           As far as the government coming and  
16 telling us what we should do, be able to do in  
17 our own business, that's kind of a little iffy  
18 there. If I could think that I could survive  
19 comfortably without the smoking, then I'd be all  
20 for it. But, personally, for me where I'm at,  
21 with 3,500 people to choose from and maybe a few  
22 of the small towns around, I don't feasibly see  
23 me staying there. I'll give it a shot for a  
24 while, but if it passes, I don't know what I'd

1 do. I'd probably have to get rid of the place  
2 and do something else.

3 Thank you for your time.

4 MR. SORENSEN: Thank you, Mr. Kollross.  
5 Are there any questions from the panel?

6 MR. DODSON: Can I ask Mr. Kollross a  
7 question?

8 MR. SORENSEN: No, sir.

9 MR. OWENS: The question I have is, the  
10 majority of your people that come to the bowling  
11 alley, are the majority of them residents from  
12 LeRoy or surrounding towns?

13 MR. KOLLROSS: There's about six  
14 communities right now. As far as the bowling on,  
15 like, my kids' leagues and of stuff like that, we  
16 don't allow any smoking at all whatsoever in the  
17 building, at all. Now, I have leagues almost  
18 every night, and they're all adults. And the  
19 nonsmokers in there, I've never heard anyone  
20 complaining about their team members or the next  
21 table over, about the smoke.

22 And, you know, I try to extract as much  
23 as I can with the smoke eaters and all that, but  
24 it's not easy in that place. I got 10,000

1 thousand foot and ceiling fans all over; the cold  
2 air return system sucks it right on out. It does  
3 a very, very good job. And, you know, if it took  
4 to where to satisfy people I had to spend more  
5 and do more, you know, then I would.

6 MR. OWENS: You said -- made a mention  
7 of the fact that some of your leagues, bowling  
8 leagues, have said if we pass this they will  
9 leave.

10 MR. KOLLROSS: They will not finish the  
11 season out.

12 MR. OWENS: And are those people in the  
13 leagues from LeRoy and the surrounding  
14 communities, correct?

15 MR. KOLLROSS: Yeah. Average league  
16 nights have been over 30 years here.

17 MR. OWENS: Okay. Now, if the County  
18 passes this and Bloomington-Normal have passed an  
19 it and McLean County is smoke-free, where's the  
20 closest bowling alley that they would be able to  
21 go over to that they'd be able to smoke in?

22 MR. KOLLROSS: Colfax, Gibson City, El  
23 Paso, Clinton, right now, that I know of. The  
24 two in Champaign-Urbana, Arrowhead and Western

1 Bowl, the lady's name is Ms. Takomia or something  
2 like that, and she lost 13 leagues this year to  
3 this next town on bowling. And she just sunk  
4 about half a million in one of the alleys and she  
5 probably might have to close it, but she won't  
6 know until after this year. And, like I said,  
7 with a hundred thousand people to choose from,  
8 you could get more clients and more chances on  
9 getting newer clients. So right now, I mean, we  
10 attract a lot of different towns around here, so  
11 we do the best we can on providing back to the  
12 community.

13 We'd like to keep it going, do the best  
14 we can. It's just hard for a bowler to sneak  
15 outside in the winter, it's not California or  
16 Florida where the beer gardens would work, you  
17 know. It's hard for them to go out in between  
18 frames. And if they can go an hour or two, but a  
19 lot of them, having a cocktail, too, so that  
20 makes it even tougher for smokers to do that.

21 Like I said, I buried my mom right after  
22 911 from smoking and lung cancer from it, and  
23 then dealing with clients I have over the years,  
24 that's the bad things. But there's other things

1 that cause just as much damage to the body, too,  
2 that gets overlooked or not as preyed upon as  
3 much.

4 Have I answered your question?

5 MR. OWENS: Yes.

6 MR. SORENSEN: Any other questions for  
7 Mr. Kollross?

8 Thank you, sir.

9 MR. KOLLROSS: Thank you for your time.

10 MR. SORENSEN: I just -- I guess I feel  
11 compelled, I'm not intentionally being rude.  
12 There are standards for how public hearings are  
13 required to be held, and that includes really not  
14 allowing a debate environment where members of  
15 the audience ask other members of the audience  
16 for the record. If anyone would like to come  
17 back to the presentation table, you're welcome to  
18 sign up again to do so.

19 Mr. Steven McLeese.

20 MR. McLEESE: Good evening. My name is  
21 Steven McLeese. I live at 22009 East 2100 North  
22 Road in Towanda. I've been a resident in McLean  
23 County for over 52 years. And I would just like  
24 to ask the Board, how many of you people live in

1 the county, not in Bloomington-Normal, but  
2 actually in the county?

3 MR. SORENSEN: I do.

4 (Mr. Sweeney raised his hand.)

5 MR. McLEESE: And some of the people  
6 that spoke earlier I got the impression, perhaps,  
7 were students and were not from here originally.  
8 I don't know if that's true or not, but I guess  
9 it doesn't matter.

10 I would like to say that I do not  
11 smoke. I smoked for 15 years in my life and I  
12 quit 18 years ago. I'm very proud of that fact,  
13 and I'm one of the biggest advocates of people  
14 not smoking. And I tell my friends that smoke  
15 all the time you shouldn't smoke. It's bad for  
16 you, don't do it.

17 However, to me, it's not a question of  
18 smoking, it's a question of rights. Who has the  
19 right to smoke? Who has the right -- if you can  
20 sell cigarettes, then you have the right to smoke  
21 cigarettes or tobacco and whatever you want to.  
22 And I abhor it, I really do. It changed my life  
23 so much by not smoking. And that was my choice  
24 and that was my right to do so, and it was my

1 right to smoke for the 15 years that I did  
2 smoke. And I'll have to tell you for those 15  
3 years I enjoyed it, but I enjoy having clean  
4 lungs.

5 But I also enjoy going to the bars in  
6 the county, Merna Tap, Kicks Bar and Grill,  
7 Mustang Sally's, the Danvers Y, a very small  
8 handful. We're not talking about the Pub II,  
9 we're not talking about Schooners. That's  
10 already been decided. And it's you people right  
11 here who are going to decide whether this handful  
12 of bars is going to ban smoking, and it's you  
13 guys' choice to do that. It's your right to do  
14 that.

15 But I would just like to say to you that  
16 as an American citizen, as a citizen of this  
17 county, I'm watching my rights be rolled away.  
18 Two days ago President Bush signed into law and  
19 took away my right of habeas corpus, and that  
20 disturbs me very much.

21 And what also disturbs me is that you  
22 people are going to decide whether or not I can  
23 go to the bar and sit with my friends, some of  
24 whom smoke, some of whom don't. When I sit there

1 with them, we talk, we laugh, we have a good  
2 time. And I don't see any of you people in that  
3 bar, you know, so why should you be concerned  
4 about the health issues in that bar when you  
5 don't go there? Why should you be concerned  
6 whether or not you can have a cheeseburger in a  
7 smoke-free environment?

8           You don't go there. The people that go  
9 there know what it's like, that choose to go  
10 there. I go there, and I don't like to smoke  
11 sometimes, but I'm willing to put up with the  
12 smoke for my friends. And I advocate not smoking  
13 to my friends all the time.

14           The people that work in the bars,  
15 somebody brought up workers' issues, all the  
16 workers that I know that work in the bars, they  
17 all smoke. It's their choice. They might quit  
18 working if they can't smoke there and find a  
19 place where they can. So it's their right,  
20 workers' rights. They have the right.

21           And I propose to you that maybe you  
22 should go and take a survey of the customers of  
23 these bars, ask them what they think. Go there  
24 every day for a month. When somebody walks in,

1 ask them if they want a smoke-free bar or not.

2 Maybe that's the fair way of doing that.

3           You know, I understand your position. I  
4 appreciate it, I really do. I wish nobody  
5 smoked. If you want to stop smoking, chop off  
6 the head of the snake. Go to Winston-Salem,  
7 start there. Why start here? And, you know, I'm  
8 starting to get on a rant so I better stop  
9 because I don't want to be taken out of here in  
10 handcuffs. But that's my feelings and I will be  
11 at more of these meetings and I will be up here,  
12 maybe a little better prepared, maybe with some  
13 facts and maybe with some other people's  
14 comments. But to see our rights as Americans be  
15 eroded away and being taken away at the federal  
16 level and now at the county level, it's just not  
17 right. You people do not have the right to tell  
18 me what I can do, I don't believe.

19           That's about all I have to say. Thank  
20 you.

21           MR. SORENSEN: Are there any questions  
22 of the panel?

23           MR. SELTZER: I do. First off, I just  
24 want to say something and not get defensive, but

1 we're all residents of McLean County. And I'm  
2 sorry I live in the Town of Normal, I really am,  
3 but I'm not going to apologize for that one bit.  
4 And I go to the bars.

5 MR. KOLLROSS: I wouldn't be sorry for  
6 living in the Town of Normal. I work for the  
7 Town of Normal. The Town of Normal's a great  
8 place.

9 MR. SELTZER: All I am trying to say is  
10 that we're all residents of the county, number  
11 one. Number two, no one's trying to take away  
12 anybody's right smoke. We're talking about where  
13 that right starts and where that right ends.  
14 There's a big difference there --

15 MR. KOLLROSS: It starts where I hang  
16 out; it starts in my place. You're talking about  
17 my people that I go to see, my people that I love  
18 and care about.

19 MR. SELTZER: I am trying to be nice,  
20 and I gave you the opportunity to talk.

21 MR. KOLLROSS: You're giving me the old  
22 eyebrows up and everything. Don't tell me you're  
23 not.

24 MR. SELTZER: I am not giving you an

1 eyebrow at all. I'm giving you an eyebrow now  
2 because I waited very patiently while you spoke,  
3 and I just wanted to ask a couple questions --

4 MR. KOLLROSS: You didn't like what I  
5 said, did you.

6 MR. SORENSEN: Gentlemen, I'm going to  
7 have to gavel that, although I don't have a  
8 gavel.

9 MR. KOLLROSS: I teach CPR, too. I save  
10 people's lives. Have you ever saved anybody's  
11 life?

12 MR. SELTZER: Yes, I have. Doesn't get  
13 to your question. Save it to the end.

14 MR. SORENSEN: Mr. Fred Dodson?

15 MR. DODSON: I apologize, I don't  
16 understand your rules. But I'll ask you, how  
17 many of you people actually leave  
18 Bloomington-Normal and come out and visit the  
19 county on a regular basis? You talk about  
20 Schooners, you talk about Bloomington-Normal, how  
21 many times do you get out and visit the county.  
22 Okay?

23 Mr. Kollross made a statement about his  
24 place, but he failed to recognize that across the

1 street the bus shed, the dust and diesel fuel  
2 will choke you out of that place. But are we  
3 going to stop our buses from running? I don't  
4 think -- should we let our school district let  
5 that happen? There's tons of places in  
6 Bloomington-Normal to go.

7           If you want to come out in the county,  
8 enjoy our rules, you got your rules already in  
9 Bloomington-Normal, talk about Schooners, sir,  
10 how many times do you actually come out and enjoy  
11 the atmosphere, the hospitality, the good  
12 neighbors in the county? How many times a week,  
13 sir, do you come out in the county?

14           MR. SELTZER: Probably three times a  
15 month.

16           MR. DODSON: Three times a month. Do  
17 you enjoy yourself?

18           MR. SELTZER: Absolutely.

19           MR. DODSON: Pretty nice, isn't it.

20           MR. SELTZER: Yes.

21           MR. DODSON: We're just down folks (sic)  
22 trying to get by. That's all we want to do. But  
23 Mr. Kollross failed to recognize about the school  
24 bus fumes. When the wind's blowing right, the

1 fumes off them diesel buses will choke you like  
2 you won't believe.

3           So you still have the right to choose  
4 where you want to go, how to run your business,  
5 where you want to spend your money at. I hope  
6 you people agree with that. When it comes to  
7 food business, smoking or not, you have a choice  
8 yourself up there where I'm going to spend my  
9 entertainment dollars. That's your choice. We  
10 want to spend ours here, we'll spend them here.  
11 You want to spend yours there, it's still your  
12 choice where you want to spend your dollars at.  
13 And that's what it's coming down to, where you  
14 going to spend your money.

15           MR. SORENSEN: Thank you, Mr. Dodson.

16           MR. SORENSEN: Mr. Scott Tuggle.

17           MR. TUGGLE: Hello. You've seen me  
18 before, Scott Tuggle, Kicks Bar and Grill in  
19 Towanda. I've been doing some research for the  
20 last five weeks. We've been going back and forth  
21 to Springfield; they've done their smoking ban in  
22 Springfield. I've got an article in the paper,  
23 the Springfield paper, as far as percentages as  
24 far as businesses going down, as far as business

1 due to the smoking ban. We've got a D. H.  
2 Brown's that is down 40 percent; we've got Track  
3 Shack, business is down 42 percent; Stadium,  
4 business is down 40 percent; Cheers, business is  
5 down 50 percent; Max's Lounge is down 25 percent;  
6 VFW is down 25 percent. The list goes on and  
7 on. I've got another ten or twelve bars here.  
8 And these are mom and pop bars. These are not  
9 your TGIF Fridays, these are not your Bennigan's  
10 that have bottomless pockets that can take money  
11 from one business to another business to keep the  
12 business going. These are privately owned  
13 businesses, just like you and me.

14           If I took a 20 percent cut in business  
15 in one month or two months or three months, I'd  
16 be gone. We are private individuals that own  
17 private bars. If the smoking ban goes into  
18 effect, I've been in the bar business for 32  
19 years; 32 years. I've worked all my life in this  
20 business. This is my retirement. In one month,  
21 I could lose everything I have.

22           That's my plea to you, is that if this  
23 smoking ban does go into effect, and this is a  
24 proof of fact right here in the paper, I could

1 lose everything in 45 to 60 days. And so could  
2 Merna Tap, so could John; all these people could  
3 lose everything within 30 to 60 days if this  
4 smoking ban goes into effect.

5 That's all I've got to say.

6 MR. SORENSEN: Questions of the panel?

7 MR. OWENS: I have a question, Scott.

8 Thank you again for coming. I know you were here  
9 last time.

10 MR. TUGGLE: Right.

11 MR. OWENS: That's from the Pantagraph,  
12 you said?

13 MR. TUGGLE: No, this is from the  
14 Springfield paper.

15 MR. OWENS: Okay.

16 MR. TUGGLE: Because the smoking ban did  
17 go into effect in Springfield.

18 MR. OWENS: In the City of Springfield,  
19 correct?

20 MR. TUGGLE: Yes.

21 MR. OWENS: Has Sangamon County passed  
22 the ordinance; do we know?

23 MR. SORENSEN: Yes.

24 MR. TUGGLE: Okay. This is -- now, this

1 is the good part. In the same article, in an  
2 unincorporated area, their business went up 80  
3 percent. There is a bar that went up 80 percent  
4 in an unincorporated area in Springfield, that  
5 went up 80 percent, that is the size of -- I  
6 don't know if everybody is familiar with Kicks or  
7 whatever in Towanda. Their business, they are  
8 the number one beer sale in the Springfield area  
9 right now. Their business went up 80 percent.  
10 They charge a \$3 cover charge, because they allow  
11 smoking, to listen to a jukebox. And it's in the  
12 paper that says their business is up 80 percent.

13 MR. RUUD: Scott, are you submitting  
14 that paper?

15 MR. TUGGLE: You can have it, sure.

16 MR. SORENSEN: Any other questions for  
17 Mr. Tuggle?

18 Thank you, sir.

19 I'll write you in. Ms. Lanier?

20 MS. LANIER: Yes. Again, I'm Jackie  
21 Lanier. First, thanks for calling us students.  
22 I've been out of school for over ten years, but  
23 that's always nice. And although, you know, I  
24 was born and raised here, I've been a resident of

1 McLean County for over ten years. I chose the  
2 place because I like this community.

3           Again, as we said, this is a public  
4 health issue. And we do live in this community.  
5 We want this community to thrive and grow and be  
6 a good community, and of course we don't want to  
7 see anyone go out of business.

8           So I can't state (sic) to you to the  
9 article that was just mentioned in the paper, but  
10 we do know of legitimate studies, overall  
11 studies, looking at cities and states that have  
12 been smoke-free for over a year, we don't see  
13 overall that there has been an economic impact,  
14 overall.

15           Why a business goes out of business, I  
16 think there's a lot of factors that might  
17 attribute to that, and to attribute it just to  
18 smoking, I think that's hard to say. Especially  
19 when Springfield, I'm not sure when it came out,  
20 but their ordinance just went into effect in  
21 September.

22           So to look at it within just a month, I  
23 think that's hard to say, that it was just due to  
24 smoking. If you look overall, it can take a

1 year, a couple years to really look at it. And  
2 we know from studies, legitimate studies that are  
3 out there, that overall we don't see an economic  
4 impact.

5           There's a lot of mention to rights and  
6 personal rights, and no one wants to take  
7 anyone's right away, of course not. Smokers have  
8 to smoke, and that's fine if they want to smoke.  
9 However, their rights, when they start to  
10 infringe upon other people's rights, and that  
11 secondhand smoke starts to -- I breathe that in,  
12 well, then, where are my rights? And that's what  
13 it comes down to.

14           And, sure, I can choose to go to  
15 anyplace that I want to, whether smoking or  
16 nonsmoking. But it's not just about me, but it's  
17 about that worker or that bartender that's in  
18 there, or that bowling alley worker. And you can  
19 say sure, they have a right to be there, but why  
20 should they have to choose between a paycheck and  
21 being healthy, and I don't think they should.

22           Like I said before, I think most of us  
23 do work in an environment that is smoke-free. I  
24 couldn't imagine going to work and working in an

1 environment where there was smoking. I think  
2 that we should allow that same right to everyone  
3 across the board. Everyone deserves clean air.

4 As far as eating Snickers and eating  
5 cheeseburgers, sure, that affects that person,  
6 but it doesn't affect other people. You have the  
7 right to eat whatever you want and, again, you  
8 have that right to smoke. Again, when that  
9 starts to affect other people, that's when we  
10 have to look at it, and that's when government  
11 can step in and enact laws to protect those  
12 people.

13 Again, I want to thank you for your  
14 time. This is a difficult issue. But if we  
15 really look at the nuts and bolts of it, it's a  
16 health issue. And if we look at other cities and  
17 states across the nation, overall, it's been a  
18 good thing for them, a positive thing for them.  
19 And if they're still thriving, New York City is  
20 still thriving, and Lexington, Kentucky, the  
21 heart of tobacco land, is thriving with a  
22 smoke-free ordinance, then I think here in McLean  
23 County we would do the same.

24 Again, I thank you for your time.

1 MR. BUTLER: I have a question.

2 MS. LANIER: Sure.

3 MR. BUTLER: What can you -- you talked  
4 about studies. Can you tell me where I could  
5 find those? Are they on the Internet or --

6 MS. LANIER: I can tell you. There is a  
7 site you can go to, smokefreeIllinois.org. But I  
8 can give you this sheet right here, which lists  
9 not only studies, and there's an article  
10 examining impact of clean indoor air ordinances,  
11 found that strict environmental smoke-free laws  
12 in those five counties with the strongest  
13 ordinance had no economic impact on restaurant  
14 sales in these counties. And that's cited in the  
15 North Carolina Medical Journal.

16 So I would say if you're going to look  
17 at studies or cite things or different articles,  
18 let's look to legitimate or medical studies that  
19 have really looked at over the long run, but I  
20 can give you this sheet now.

21 MR. SORENSEN: Thank you. Are there any  
22 other members of the public that would like to  
23 present testimony this evening?

24 None heard, this public hearing will

1 then adjourn to be reconvened on October 24th at  
2 The Den at Fox Creek at the Clubhouse at seven  
3 o'clock p.m. Thank you, everyone, for  
4 attending. We appreciate your time and your  
5 interest in sharing your perspective.

1 MR. SORENSEN: Good evening. I'm Matt  
2 Sorensen. We'll go ahead and call the meeting of  
3 the McLean County Finance Committee to order.  
4 This is actually a continuation of a public  
5 hearing that we've had two other sessions of. At  
6 the table at the front are the members of the  
7 McLean County Finance Committee. To my far left  
8 is Mr. Duane Moss, to my immediate right is Mr.  
9 Ben Owens, to my immediate right is Mr. John  
10 Butler, and to my far right is Mr. Bob Nuckols,  
11 and I'm Matt Sorensen, the Chairman of the  
12 Finance Committee.

13 The intent of this session is to gather  
14 public input regarding the proposed smoking ban  
15 in McLean County. We'll avoid getting into a  
16 dialogue; members of the Committee may ask  
17 clarifying questions, though. If you would like  
18 to return to present additional testimony, we  
19 will allow that, but you'll have to sign up a  
20 second time to do so. The sign-up sheets are at  
21 the far left of this table, and there's also a  
22 file up there for anyone who would like to  
23 provide written comment to the case file, and  
24 it's there. Thank you, Duane. Duane Moss,

1 acting the role of Vanna White.

2 So with that we'll get started. The  
3 first person who has signed up to present this  
4 evening is Mr. John Krueger.

5 We have a microphone here if anyone  
6 needs to use it.

7 DR. KRUEGER: John Krueger. I am a  
8 retired physician. I practiced medicine in  
9 McLean County for over 30 years, but I speak  
10 tonight on behalf of the Coalition for a  
11 Smoke-Free --

12 MR. SORENSEN: I'm sorry, Dr. Krueger,  
13 would you mind please stating your address as  
14 well as your name when you begin.

15 DR. KRUEGER: I live at 1108 Asbury  
16 Farms in Normal.

17 The Coalition is comprised of  
18 individuals and groups, many of whom are health  
19 care professionals, and we saw our role in this  
20 as educational. Some of the members are both  
21 hospital systems, McLean County Medical Society,  
22 which is now close to 300 physicians, IWU School  
23 of Nursing, of course our own McLean County  
24 Health Department, for which we're grateful for

1 their expertise and guidance, and the Chamber of  
2 Commerce, which represents a good many businesses  
3 in town, and they have come out endorsing  
4 smoke-free legislation.

5           In 1964, the then Surgeon General of the  
6 United States, Luther Terry, published a really  
7 significant article on the adverse effects of  
8 smoking. Within 20 years, reports appeared  
9 demonstrating a similar effect for secondary  
10 smoke exposure. Those were nonsmokers who either  
11 through the work environment or at home were  
12 exposed to smokers, and reports began to appear  
13 of the adverse effect on their health.

14           There's all kinds of statistics on  
15 deaths; it's estimated 50 or 60,000 people a year  
16 die from secondary smoke, not smoking. Lost work  
17 due to illness related to smoke exposure in the  
18 millions, your health care premiums, your life  
19 insurance premiums are all adversely affected by  
20 this condition.

21           It's authoritative enough now that there  
22 isn't one medical voice in the country that  
23 doesn't agree that secondary smoke exposure is  
24 not only morbid, it's lethal. The AMA, the

1 National Cancer Institute, American Heart  
2 Association, American Lung Association, and so  
3 on, so it's a pretty impressive story in terms of  
4 the adverse effects of secondary smoke.

5 We don't think anybody should have to  
6 trade a job for their health, and many employers  
7 have obviously agreed with that and they've on  
8 their own gone to some sort of smoke abatement or  
9 smoke-free environment. Surveys consistently  
10 show that only 20 percent of the population are  
11 smokers, and that's the same for those who think  
12 that they would endorse this sort of legislation,  
13 and that includes McLean County.

14 It isn't as if this is a radical idea.  
15 The state of California went smoke free in '95  
16 for restaurants, and three years later they  
17 included their bars. Many other states, I guess  
18 there are now something like 16 or 17 states that  
19 are smoke free, there are many large cities like  
20 New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, even Lexington,  
21 Kentucky, a state that obviously thrives on  
22 tobacco revenues, has gone smoke free. More  
23 locally, we have Springfield, Champaign-Urbana,  
24 DeKalb, and of course our Twin Cities.

1 I mention this for two reasons. Because  
2 these laws have been in effect for so long,  
3 there's a growing number of studies that measure  
4 two things: one, the economic impact, which is  
5 always the first concern to the businesses, and  
6 two, what are the clinical; have we, by passing  
7 these laws, really affected people's health, and  
8 the answers are increasingly positive on both  
9 accounts.

10 There are numerous, numerous studies,  
11 based on objective criteria, namely, sales tax  
12 receipts, that businesses are not hurt, and in  
13 fact many of them improved, and that's probably  
14 because 80 percent of us are nonsmokers and may  
15 be now patronizing other businesses that we  
16 wouldn't have otherwise gone into.

17 In terms of the health consequences, I  
18 did give you each a handout on the Committee, and  
19 this just happened to be this month but this has  
20 been going on for 20 years, everybody knew  
21 there'd be some long-term improvement in public  
22 health.

23 What's been pleasantly surprising is the  
24 immediate impact of smoke-free legislation.

1 There's been a tremendous reduction in illness  
2 among employees and patrons of smoke  
3 environments, and that's referenced there in your  
4 handout. We tend to focus on the restaurants and  
5 bars, but I have to remind the Committee that  
6 McLean County has an awful lot of other  
7 businesses that, too, will be impacted by this  
8 legislation.

9 I'd just like to say one final word  
10 about the third objection that people raise to  
11 this type of legislation, and that's an issue of  
12 rights. I have a right to smoke because it's a  
13 legal product, and we don't disagree with that.  
14 I think most of us agree that your rights stop  
15 when they impinge or deny somebody else's  
16 rights.

17 And we hear stories like well, why don't  
18 you legislate against obesity, because that's  
19 lethal, and alcohol consumption and so on. And,  
20 obviously, the big difference is if you overeat I  
21 don't gain weight. If you drink too much  
22 alcohol, I don't get liver cirrhosis. But when  
23 you smoke in my air, then I am exposed to now a  
24 well-documented morbid and lethal substance.

1           So in conclusion, I think that the  
2 science is irrefutable that our current Surgeon  
3 General, just within the last two months, came  
4 out further substantiating the adverse effects of  
5 secondhand smoke exposure. I think we look to  
6 the government bodies to provide for the public  
7 safety. This is a public health issue. You can  
8 do a tremendous amount for this generation and  
9 subsequent ones by taking a vote to enact  
10 smoke-free legislation.

11           I thank you for your time, especially on  
12 a World Series night.

13           MR. SORENSEN: Thank you, Doctor. Are  
14 there any other questions of the Committee for  
15 Dr. Krueger?

16           Dr. Krueger, you referred to handouts,  
17 were these three documents --

18           DR. KRUEGER: No, I gave just the one,  
19 the stapled one. The others are from someone  
20 else.

21           MR. SORENSEN: There a copy in the  
22 folder already.

23           MR. RUUD: (Nodding head.)

24           DR. KRUEGER: It just happened to come

1 out this month so it was extremely timely.

2 MR. SORENSEN: The next presenter is  
3 Nancy Wisted.

4 MS. WISTED: And the other two -- at  
5 least two handouts I brought, these two. I think  
6 I can probably talk loud enough. I'm not going  
7 to allude --

8 MR. SORENSEN: Ma'am, your address  
9 also?

10 MS. WISTED: I'm sorry. Nancy Wisted,  
11 2834 East 250 North Road, McLean.

12 MS. WISTED: I just want to encourage  
13 the McLean County Board to pass a comprehensive  
14 smoke-free ordinance for those of us who live and  
15 some of us who work in the rural areas of the  
16 county. As Dr. Krueger alluded to, it is a  
17 public health issue, and it's a public health  
18 issue for those of us that have to go into  
19 businesses.

20 And I realize there's not a lot of  
21 restaurants in the unincorporated areas, but  
22 there's a lot of other types of businesses,  
23 agriculture business and so forth that those of  
24 us have to go into, and then we are exposed to

1 the secondhand smoke, for those that are not  
2 smoke free. And it's just as important for us  
3 that live out in the country to have the same  
4 smoke-free ordinances that -- comprehensive, that  
5 are similar to the ones that are going into  
6 effect in Bloomington-Normal in January.

7           And Dr. Krueger alluded to the rights  
8 that people think they have to smoke so I'm not  
9 going to address that, but some people talk about  
10 that smoke-free laws are needless regulation by  
11 the government, but I disagree with that because  
12 we have a lot of regulations on us already for  
13 drunk driving, for traffic, for food safety  
14 ordinances and laws and clean water, and clean  
15 air is just as important as some of those. And I  
16 really don't see a difference in having clean air  
17 ordinances as we do for safe food.

18           Thank you.

19           MR. SORENSEN: Thank you. Questions  
20 from the Committee? Mr. Owens.

21           MR. OWENS: I have a question.  
22 Actually, I have two questions. First is that  
23 out of the community that you're out in there,  
24 what businesses are --

1 MS. WISTED: You would have grain  
2 elevators, implement dealers, and I can't tell  
3 you, some of them might be smoke free already.  
4 My husband farms, so I know that those are the  
5 types of businesses you have fertilizer dealers.  
6 Those types are the ones that I'm more familiar  
7 with.

8 MR. OWENS: You also know that -- you  
9 said in your statement the unincorporated areas.  
10 That does not affect the actual town of McLean.

11 MS. WISTED: That's right, but some of  
12 your agricultural businesses are in the  
13 unincorporated areas.

14 MR. OWENS: Okay. That clarifies it.

15 MR. SORENSEN: Any other questions from  
16 the Committee?

17 Thank you, ma'am.

18 MR. SHAW: Greg Shaw. I teach for a  
19 living so I'll probably be able to do this okay  
20 just like this. Thanks for coming this evening.

21 MR. SORENSEN: Your address?

22 MR. SHAW: The last name is spelled  
23 S-h-a-w; the address is 1104 North Roosevelt  
24 Avenue, Bloomington, Bloomington.

1           I'm just coming as a citizen of the  
2 community that I'm grateful that the City  
3 Councils have passed comprehensive smoke-free  
4 ordinances. I'm coming to you essentially as a  
5 civil libertarian. I'm very aware of the issues,  
6 the complications that arise for individuals as  
7 they confront a community that wants to put out  
8 an ordinance or a rule of this sort, and so I'm  
9 acutely aware of the trade-offs that one has to  
10 engage in when we're talking about this sort of  
11 issue.

12           But I'm also very aware that this is not  
13 just a question of convenience for folks, it's a  
14 question of lives and of public health. If,  
15 indeed, this area goes forward with a  
16 comprehensive indoor smoking ban, based on the  
17 natural experience that we've seen in Helena,  
18 Montana, and Pueblo, Colorado over the last few  
19 years where those communities went smoke free,  
20 there is a significant decrease in the heart  
21 attack rates. So, yes, I understand the symbolic  
22 concerns of people who are concerned about their  
23 rights, their perceived right to smoke, but I  
24 believe that's trumped by the public health

1 concerns that are evident across the board.

2 I would just echo what Dr. Krueger said  
3 also, that rights of businesses is a complicated  
4 thing. If my right to swing my fist ends at my  
5 neighbor's nose, by analogy, my right to exhale  
6 carcinogens also ends at my neighbor's nose. So  
7 the piece about a right to go and smoke in a  
8 given place, I think, is trumped at an empirical  
9 level by the evidence we have about what happens  
10 in communities that outlaw smoking in public  
11 places, but also on a theoretic level, in an  
12 infringement of my more fundamental right to  
13 breathe and to do the best I can to maintain my  
14 health. So I strongly encourage you to move  
15 forward in a positive manner with this.

16 I'm not a small business owner, but I  
17 also -- I assume that small business people would  
18 appreciate the level playing field that would be  
19 created by bringing about a more comprehensive  
20 smoke-free county ordinance on a broader basis.  
21 To the extent there is migration, where the city  
22 folks might go out to the country to go to an  
23 establishment to smoke, to the extent there is  
24 that migration, I think it will probably level.

1 We can -- we can avoid that or minimize that  
2 problem by going with -- creating, bringing about  
3 a more level playing field. And I think going to  
4 the county level is the next logical step. I  
5 look forward to moving forward with this in a  
6 positive way.

7 MR. OWENS: The thing I want to touch on  
8 here, you said the different migration and the  
9 level playing field. The comment I have is that  
10 with Bloomington-Normal going smoke free and the  
11 county doing it in the unincorporated areas, a  
12 lot of the small towns that will not be affected,  
13 and a lot of them are small town moms and pops  
14 that own those within those different cities of  
15 Colfax and Heyworth, does that not complete --  
16 doesn't it not allow for an equal playing field  
17 with those that just happen to be out in the  
18 county that might be less than two miles away  
19 from, say, the city of Downs?

20 MR. SHAW: Perhaps, but I think the  
21 comeback to that is the further we can spread  
22 this sort of ordinance, the more level playing  
23 field we will create. The next logical step  
24 would be the state, to truly create a level

1 playing field. I guess, even going that step,  
2 you get folks along the borders who would  
3 complain well, they'll go to Iowa, they'll go to  
4 Indiana, whatever. I think to the extent each  
5 step represents bring about the more level  
6 playing field is a good thing, both in the  
7 fundamental sense of fairness and a practical  
8 business sense.

9           So yes, there may be pockets left  
10 because of the -- the fractured jurisdiction that  
11 we see in the county, but to the extent we can  
12 take another step to bring about that level  
13 playing field, I think that's a fair and wise  
14 thing to do.

15           MR. SORENSEN: Any other questions from  
16 the Committee?

17           Thank you, Mr. Shaw.

18           Allen Gibson.

19           MR. GIBSON: Allen Gibson, 503 West  
20 Miller, Bloomington. I just made a few notes of  
21 things I'd like to bring before this Board. I'm  
22 totally against the smoking ban. I was from the  
23 start, I still am. I'm a nonsmoker and I don't  
24 drink so this directly does not affect me,

1 whether people smoke or not, okay, because if  
2 they smoke I won't go into the smoke if it  
3 bothers me.

4           But the thing of it is I've heard some  
5 comments and I've heard a lot of things, I've got  
6 stacks of papers that I've gotten on this smoking  
7 ban, how they support the smoking ban, but all  
8 the majority of them are opinions, they are not  
9 fact. They say there are 68,000 people a year  
10 die from secondhand smoke. But I have never yet,  
11 and I don't know of anybody that's got one, a  
12 death certificate that says the death was caused  
13 by secondhand smoke, okay?

14           Now, OSHA and EPA have not found the  
15 secondhand smoke a health hazard. These are the  
16 people that's supposed to look out for us  
17 nationwide. And there seems to be a national  
18 agenda to take it away from the authorities and  
19 federal government and the state government to  
20 bring it to the local government to chip away at  
21 our rights to manage our businesses as we should  
22 see fit.

23           If people don't want to smoke in the  
24 tavern, they shouldn't go in. These are adult

1 situations. So, anyway, this is one way to take  
2 our rights away through the back door, take a  
3 little today, a little bit tomorrow. There's  
4 always a reason for changing this.

5           And the smoking in public buildings,  
6 okay, a public building is a building used by  
7 John Q. Public that has to go there for the  
8 services, okay? But he doesn't have to go into  
9 the tavern where there's smoking. Now, that's a  
10 private operation that is conforming and giving  
11 service to the public, but the public can go  
12 somewhere else if they don't want to go there.  
13 But in the regular government buildings there's  
14 no reason why they can't ban smoking in that  
15 because that belongs to everybody.

16           But if this was such a health hazard, I  
17 still don't understand why the federal government  
18 or the state government hasn't passed a smoking  
19 ban instead of coming and asking the individuals  
20 here to take the rights away from one to give to  
21 the other. If I take your rights away, I affect  
22 my rights as well, okay? And this is what they  
23 want to do.

24           Tobacco is a legal product, and as you

1 well know, it's well taxed. If you really and  
2 truly want a smoking ban, then ban the sale of  
3 tobacco in the state or in the county or in the  
4 city. Why continue to get this tax money and yet  
5 say smoking is bad, smoking is bad, all right?  
6 So if we lose that revenue, though, how we going  
7 to make that up?

8           There's another link to look at. In  
9 other words, this is not as simple as saying  
10 well, we shouldn't have smoking here. There's a  
11 lot of things they need to look at and needs to  
12 be refined to come up with a smoking ban, just to  
13 say that and not have anything in mind how to  
14 implement it and where you're going to go with it  
15 is not really good.

16           So I just think there's enough control  
17 of the government in businesses as it is, and I'm  
18 not a businessman, but I defend these people's  
19 rights to operate their business. They're the  
20 ones that's got the investment, not me. Of  
21 course I was against the smoking ban in the city  
22 of Bloomington. I think it was wrong. You know,  
23 they definitely need a definitive thing on these,  
24 in other words, description of what they want in

1 a smoking ban. They shouldn't just say we're  
2 going to have a smoking ban, take it or leave  
3 it.

4           You've got to understand it, the smoke  
5 banners have an agenda, and they absolutely,  
6 flatly refuse to compromise in any way. They  
7 stated that at a meeting. Hard to compromise.  
8 They say this is a health issue. Well, it is and  
9 it isn't. You take an adult that goes into a  
10 smoke-filled room, they do that at their choice.  
11 I shouldn't have to tell them not go there, but  
12 then they complain because there's smoke there,  
13 but they go in there knowing they're smoking in a  
14 tavern.

15           When the smoking ban was implemented in  
16 Bloomington, I know it's been thrown out to a lot  
17 of people and a lot of places that Bloomington  
18 went with Normal. Well -- and there's no level  
19 playing field in this. Okay, when we went  
20 through with Bloomington, 53 percent of the  
21 people contacted me, a lot of them even  
22 identified themselves as nonsmokers, did not want  
23 the smoking ban. They said the businesses should  
24 make this decision.

1           So --, I mean this is not taking -- this  
2 is not a -- like they did that study at Illinois  
3 Wesleyan, said they wanted a smoking ban and all  
4 that. Well, this was a class. And you know as  
5 well as I do, some of these surveys they make,  
6 you can get them to go the way you want by how  
7 you ask questions. Most of those people that  
8 were involved in that from Illinois Wesleyan  
9 graduated and are gone, okay?

10           But we've got to remember the property  
11 rights of the individual, okay? The investments  
12 they have in this business, they're going to make  
13 the decision that's going to make them the  
14 profit. But if it's more profitable for them to  
15 have smoking, then I think they should have that  
16 right.

17           As far as -- this is one I just got --  
18 as far as the smoking ban and how it's affected  
19 people, this is from Springfield, and it has to  
20 do with the unincorporated areas and the  
21 businesses in Springfield. One business here  
22 lost more than 50 percent of their clientele  
23 since the smoking ban went into effect, like the  
24 Track Shack, business down 42 percent, American

1 Legion No. 32, business down more than 50  
2 percent, and it just goes on and on down through  
3 here the businesses that have lost business and  
4 money. This is going to cost the cities and the  
5 taxpayers money.

6           And as far as -- and some people have  
7 actually quit their jobs, you know, waiters and  
8 waitresses in taverns, because they're not making  
9 the money they were making before. They're just  
10 not getting the tips. It's a two-edged sword.  
11 And I understand people that have a problem, but.

12           If I had asthma, I'm not going to go  
13 into a smoking atmosphere. But I can make that  
14 decision as an adult. I really shouldn't have to  
15 have somebody to tell me how to run my life,  
16 saying I can't go into this business, I'll take  
17 his rights away from him.

18           Well, I could go on and on, but I really  
19 am opposed to this. I was opposed to it when it  
20 was brought before the City Council. The first  
21 vote on that, I understand the first vote on that  
22 smoking ban in Bloomington was five to three.  
23 Then they brought it up to amend that, and I said  
24 to them how do you amend something you just voted

1 down. They amended it so they could smoke  
2 outside and declared it a smoking ban.

3 That's about all I got, and I appreciate  
4 the time we get to talk about this. And like I  
5 say, to me it's a legal issue and it's a rights  
6 issue and I even carry a copy of the Constitution  
7 in my briefcase. Anyway, so that's really all I  
8 got to say about it.

9 I heard them say that this is -- they  
10 did it in the council meeting, that this was a  
11 health issue, right, it affects the lungs. My  
12 comment is you're talking about 68,000 people  
13 supposedly that die from secondhand smoke a year,  
14 but what about the little babies that never draw  
15 a breath because they're aborted.

16 Thank you very much.

17 (Applause.)

18 MR. SORENSEN: Are there any questions  
19 of the Committee for Mr. Gibson?

20 MR. OWENS: I think he made mention of  
21 that article. Was that submitted for an earlier  
22 meeting?

23 MR. SORENSEN: Was that out of the  
24 Springfield paper?

1                   MR. GIBSON: It was out of The Gazette.  
2 They mailed it to me. If you want it, you're  
3 more than welcome to it.

4                   MR. OWENS: Well, I'm just saying,  
5 because at an earlier time there was one  
6 submitted at Springfield as well, and I don't  
7 know if that's the same one or not.

8                   Is that pretty much the same  
9 information? Would you mind if we put this into  
10 written comment?

11                   MR. GIBSON: No, that's fine.

12                   MR. SORENSEN: Thank you, Mr. Gibson.  
13 Any other questions for Mr. Gibson? No? Thank  
14 you, sir.

15                   I would remind anyone who would like to  
16 present information or testimony, the sign-up  
17 sheet is at the end of the table. Next presenter  
18 is Jan Morris.

19                   MS. MORRIS: Could I allow Dr. Shaw to  
20 rebuttal, since he was involved in that survey?

21                   MR. SORENSEN: If Mr. Shaw would sign  
22 onto the sheet.

23                   MR. SHAW: Thank you. I'll do that as I  
24 speak because I need to run. Mr. Gibson, I

1 appreciate the fact that you've thought about the  
2 public opinion survey that was conducted at  
3 Illinois Wesleyan University. We actually did it  
4 not once, but twice, 18 months apart. We came  
5 within a percentage point of the same finding  
6 both times.

7 I hold a Ph.D in political science from  
8 Columbia University. I've been studying public  
9 opinion for over a decade. I've published more  
10 than a dozen articles in scholarly journals on  
11 the nature of American public opinion. I would  
12 be happy to discuss with you one-on-one the  
13 nature of the questions and so forth. I resent  
14 the suggestion that I cooked the figures.

15 MR. GIBSON: I didn't say --

16 MR. SHAW: I resent that. In any case,  
17 I trust that, Jan, you'll share those results  
18 with the Board members as appropriate. That's  
19 all.

20 MR. SORENSEN: Thank you, Dr. Shaw.

21 Next presenter, Jan Morris.

22 MS. MORRIS: My name is Jan Morris, I  
23 live in Hopedale, Illinois, which is not in your  
24 county, but I am Health Promotion Program Manager

1 for our McLean County Health Department, and I'm  
2 also a registered dental hygienist. I do ask  
3 that you follow the steps of the  
4 Bloomington-Normal Council and ask you to support  
5 a comprehensive smoke-free ordinance for McLean  
6 County.

7 I'd like to talk about when we say that  
8 secondhand smoke does not affect others. A  
9 patient that I had as I worked as a dental  
10 hygienist had heart disease, and she had heart  
11 surgery. And the cardiologist came out to her  
12 doctor and said -- to her daughter and said how  
13 long has your mother smoked, and she said my  
14 mother has never smoked. But she was in surgery  
15 for cardiovascular disease because her husband  
16 was a smoker. So close proximity, secondhand  
17 smoke, it is very harmful.

18 And we know that you're going to hear a  
19 number of things tonight, but I want you to  
20 remember secondhand is a health issue. The  
21 Surgeon General's report, and I'm not sure if  
22 you've all seen the executive summary, it is 700  
23 pages, the full report -- I'm sorry, 600 pages.  
24 It took them four years to prepare that; it was

1 prepared by the country's leading scientific  
2 experts.

3           And the U.S. Surgeon General, Richard  
4 Carmona, came out saying the scientific evidence  
5 is now indisputable. Secondhand smoke is not a  
6 mere annoyance, it is a serious health hazard  
7 that can lead to disease and permanent death in  
8 children and nonsmoking adults. These persons  
9 have had years of study, or scientists, health,  
10 and they came to the conclusion that there is no  
11 safe level of secondhand smoke.

12           We talk about children. We know that  
13 children who are exposed to secondhand smoke are  
14 at increased risk for sudden infant death  
15 syndrome. We also know that there are premature  
16 births and deaths because of that. They have  
17 acute respiratory infections, they have ear  
18 problems, more asthma. Smoking by parents can do  
19 that to the children.

20           We also know that exposure by adults to  
21 secondhand smoke has results on cardiovascular  
22 disease, the heart, and lung cancer. But if you  
23 would talk to people at the Community Cancer  
24 Center, they would be able to show you studies of

1 many people who have been diagnosed with a  
2 variety of cancers because secondhand smoke and  
3 tobacco affect all organs of our body.

4           So I think it's a very important health  
5 issue, and I think it's your duty to act to  
6 protect the health of all of our constituents, of  
7 all the county residents and of all of the people  
8 who live in the county, because they're going to  
9 be going to these unincorporated areas.

10           So please vote yes for a smoke-free  
11 comprehensive ordinance, and by doing this you  
12 can add McLean County to a long list of other  
13 Illinois communities. And as far as for  
14 Illinois, this was published Tuesday, October  
15 24th, today, Illinois Senate Committee on Monday  
16 considered the pros and cons of a smoking ban for  
17 the entire state, nearly 15 months after the  
18 legislature and governor gave local government  
19 the power to pass smoke-free ordinances. So not  
20 only are counties and cities and other states  
21 considering this, our state of Illinois is doing  
22 it as well.

23           Thank you.

24           MR. OWENS: You said, the last comment,

1 you said how many months with the state?

2 THE WITNESS: This says nearly 15  
3 months, but it's only been since August.

4 MR. OWENS: Okay, yeah. I just wanted  
5 to clarify because it's only been since the end  
6 of July that we were, my understanding --

7 MR. SORENSEN: At the county level.

8 MR. OWENS: At the county level at that  
9 point. I just wanted to clarify.

10 MR. SORENSEN: Any other questions for  
11 Jan Morris?

12 Thank you.

13 MR. SORENSEN: Are there any other folks  
14 here who would like to present written or oral  
15 comment to the Committee?

16 Many of you recognize Mr. Scott Tuggle.  
17 Please state your address.

18 MR. TUGGLE: Scott Tuggle, 111 South Orr  
19 in Normal, Illinois. We've met, this is the  
20 third time. I will make it short, real quick.  
21 She said 15 months. Leave it alone. If the  
22 state's going to do it, then let the state do  
23 it. Don't leave it up to you. Let's let the  
24 state do it and make it an equal playing field

1 for everybody. That's the only thing I got to  
2 say. If the state's going to do it, let them do  
3 it.

4 MR. SORENSEN: Are there any questions  
5 of Mr. Tuggle?

6 Thank you, sir.

7 MR. TUGGLE: Thank you.

8 MR. SORENSEN: Anyone else wish to  
9 present written or oral?

10 The Finance Committee will have one more  
11 public hearing on the topic. The date of that  
12 hearing will be November 2nd at seven o'clock  
13 p.m. It will be at the Government Center on the  
14 fourth floor in the County Boardroom.

15 The Finance Committee will then take up  
16 this topic action as an agenda item on November  
17 7th at four o'clock p.m. at the Government Center  
18 in the County Boardroom. That will be, I think,  
19 what we refer to as a closed agenda in that no  
20 public comment will be permitted at the November  
21 7th meeting. That will be a meeting for the  
22 purpose of the Committee to discuss the purpose  
23 of the proposal, to debate it among ourselves  
24 and, if, appropriate seek advice and input from

1 our legal counsel and from our administrative  
2 staff.

3 With that, this hearing will adjourn  
4 until continuance on November 2nd.

5 Thank you.

In November of this year the Finance Committee, of which you are a member, will vote to either allow or abolish smoking in all public places in McLean County.
